2 JIM: No, you know, really I'm being straight  
3 up, you know, I'm an agent in Dallas and California --

4 MR. SCHNEIDER: Yeah.

5 JIM: -- you know, I mean, you know, I just  
6 don't know that much about it. But you, you tell me  
7 about it. What is it?

8 MR. SCHNEIDER: Well, I mean, well, there's  
9 nothing for me to tell because I really -- I don't know  
10 other than what the report said, that someone came to  
11 the door and arrested them apparently.

12 JIM: Oh, really?

13 MR. SCHNEIDER: And when I heard that,  
14 arrested them for what? Star, don't stand on the  
15 pillow, please.

16 JIM: Yeah.

17 MR. SCHNEIDER: Stay.

18 JIM: Well, you know, just like Rachel told  
19 me a few minutes ago, she said last night she saw on  
20 the TV where the, they said 20 children left on a  
21 school bus.

22 MR. SCHNEIDER: Yeah.

23 JIM: I said yeah, I saw that too. I saw the  
24 news say that.

25 MR. SCHNEIDER: Yeah.

JIM: And they filmed the bus driving away.

1 You know, they just make up stuff. I don't know.

2 MR. SCHNEIDER: You know what amazed me  
3 though in watching that interview you asked us to watch  
4 on TV?

5 JIM: Right, um-hum.

6 MR. SCHNEIDER: That -- who is the guy that  
7 had the ATF jacket on?

8 JIM: Oh yeah, he's one of  
9 the --

10 MR. SCHNEIDER: What's his name again?

11 JIM: -- he's one of the commanders there.

12 MR. SCHNEIDER: Yeah, that particular  
13 commander said that our guys in '87 attacked the  
14 Sheriff's Department, that the battle was between them  
15 and the -- and our --

16 JIM: Well, that's not right.

17 MR. SCHNEIDER: I mean, if --

18 JIM: Yeah, I know.

19 MR. SCHNEIDER: -- how, how is a person going  
20 to do in any court of law when even ahead of time all  
21 the world's being told statements there's -- I mean,  
22 seriously?

23 JIM: No, we know -- hey listen --

24 MR. SCHNEIDER: Here's, here's supposed to be  
25 an, an efficient arm of the government that's for the  
people, for the protection of the people and stuff.

1 When I heard and saw that I mean --

2 JIM: No, I understand, Steve, but that's why  
3 we have an impartial jury.

4 MR. SCHNEIDER: I mean, but impartial jury?  
5 But I mean, you, you -- that is so simple to get the  
6 facts. Even the guy --

7 JIM: Hey, I've already talked to the sheriff  
8 and, you know, Sunday the sheriff came over. He was  
9 concerned about you guys.

10 MR. SCHNEIDER: Yeah.

11 JIM: And I talked to the sheriff and --

12 MR. SCHNEIDER: Yourself about that incident?

13 JIM: I talked to the sheriff myself about  
14 that.

15 MR. SCHNEIDER: Um-hum.

16 JIM: And do you know what he told me?

17 MR. SCHNEIDER: No, what did he tell you?

18 JIM: I'm going to tell you what he told me.  
19 He said, "Those folks out there at Mount Carmel have  
20 never caused us one bit of trouble."

21 MR. SCHNEIDER: That's true.

22 JIM: That's what he told me. And he said in  
23 '87 or '88 this guy Roden, I don't know his first name.

24 MR. SCHNEIDER: Ben Roden.

25 JIM: Yeah, and he, he got in a conflict with  
you guys, there, there was some kind of gunfire and,

1 and there was a trial.

2 MR. SCHNEIDER: And it was all directed by a  
3 man by the name of Dickerson, the Sheriff Dickerson.

4 JIM: Well, he didn't, he didn't tell me  
5 that.

6 MR. SCHNEIDER: Yeah, of course he's not  
7 going to tell you that. Our guys heard that this nutty  
8 Ben Roden had dug up a grave on the property.

9 JIM: Yeah.

10 MR. SCHNEIDER: We were at another place.  
11 Oh, his name was George Roden, I'm sorry.

12 JIM: What, what did he dig up a grave for?

13 MR. SCHNEIDER: He -- the guy's loony and he  
14 wanted to challenge David here to see who could raise  
15 this body. And he even called him up and David, you  
16 know, made him look like he -- well, just what he is.  
17 He says, "Not today, George" and hung up on him.

18 JIM: Well, the -- you know, the full facts of all  
19 that case are on the record and, you know, you --

20 MR. SCHNEIDER: Well, yeah, but if they're  
21 all on record then, I mean, I'm, I'm hearing everything  
22 but what actually happened.

23 JIM: Yeah.

24 MR. SCHNEIDER: I mean, that's the strange  
25 thing about it. So I mean, and then even to this very  
time what he said to all the press, I mean, I'm sitting

1 here -- the battle was between the Sheriff's Department  
2 and, and our few guys here, never.

3 JIM: Well, okay.

4 MR. SCHNEIDER: I mean --

5 JIM: No, I know that's --

6 MR. SCHNEIDER: -- it's awesome.

7 JIM: -- I know that's not true.

8 MR. SCHNEIDER: That, that wasn't the only  
9 misstatement, too. There was a couple more major ones  
10 by him also and I'm, I'm sitting there totally  
11 astounded by it.

12 JIM: Yeah, okay. Well, what else? Was  
13 there anything else?

14 MR. SCHNEIDER: No, anyway, it doesn't -- it  
15 hardly matters to me, you know?

16 JIM: I'll pass the word on, I mean -- you  
17 know I will --

18 MR. SCHNEIDER: Yeah.

19 JIM: -- that it's inaccurate. You know,  
20 I'll pass the word on and tell them that's inaccurate.  
21 You said this and, and that's not what happened.

22 MR. SCHNEIDER: But does it really matter  
23 though, Jim, really?

24 JIM: Well, well --

25 MR. SCHNEIDER: I mean, does it really --

JIM: -- I, I know how you feel, but what he



1 | said is not going to matter. I mean, come on, he's  
2 | not, he's not --

3 |           MR. SCHNEIDER: Well, you know, I mean not  
4 | ultimately.

5 |           JIM: No, he's not the jury, he's not the  
6 | judge, you know, he doesn't control any of that.

7 |           MR. SCHNEIDER: Well, I got to hear a little  
8 | bit about what David was sharing with you.

9 |           JIM: Yeah, um-hum. I, I told him, I said,  
10 | you know, I, I understand a little better. I'm not --  
11 | you know, he told me that he, he couldn't provide his  
12 | teaching in an hour and it would take much, much  
13 | longer.

14 |           MR. SCHNEIDER: It's really true. I mean,  
15 | here's the testimony by so many men that came and went.  
16 | In the final days it's going to be understood --

17 |           JIM: Right.

18 |           MR. SCHNEIDER: -- those that choose to  
19 | really want to know something they got to make a  
20 | commitment at some time.

21 |           JIM: Right, I understand.

22 |           MR. SCHNEIDER: But anyway --

23 |           JIM: But anyway, I think --

24 |           MR. SCHNEIDER: -- I should -- I was going to  
25 | just head downstairs. I'd better let you find out  
about those dogs rotting out there.

1 JIM: Okay. Hey, thanks for hanging in there  
2 with me.

3 MR. SCHNEIDER: Yeah, no problem.

4 JIM: Okay, Steve.

5 MR. SCHNEIDER: Okay. Do you want to --  
6 should I -- do you want to talk to someone else or --

7 JIM: No, David needs a break. I'm going to  
8 talk to --

9 MR. SCHNEIDER: Okay. I'll give you a break,  
10 too. You probably are worn out for at least all that  
11 time.

12 JIM: Well, maybe I'll take a short break and  
13 check on the dogs. Will, will you guys leave somebody  
14 near the phone if we need you?

15 MR. SCHNEIDER: Yeah.

16 JIM: Okay, and listen, if there's -- and  
17 David did tell me after he sent Mark out that if  
18 there's anybody that wants to go out, he's going to  
19 send them out. So --

20 MR. SCHNEIDER: Oh, yeah, most definitely.

21 JIM: -- so, you know, just ask around and  
22 if --

23 MR. SCHNEIDER: Okay.

24 JIM: -- if there is anybody or anybody --  
25 children you want --

MR. SCHNEIDER: Right.

1 JIM: -- you know, just tell me and we'll  
2 just go ahead and get it going. And --

3 MR. SCHNEIDER: Right, okay.

4 JIM: -- and, you know, that's, that's real  
5 smooth and, you know, no conflicts and --

6 MR. SCHNEIDER: What was that you're saying,  
7 Dave?

8 (Indiscernible voice in background.)

9 MR. SCHNEIDER: He says tell him to bring his  
10 phone and we'll keep on bugging you and using it.

11 JIM: Okay.

12 MR. SCHNEIDER: Oh, we'll bug it.

13 JIM: Oh, you'll bug it?

14 MR. SCHNEIDER: Oh, de-bug it, de-bug it. I  
15 didn't hear him.

16 JIM: Oh, bring a phone, de-bug it.

17 MR. SCHNEIDER: Yeah, bring a phone and we'll  
18 de-bug it.

19 JIM: Wait a minute, I got to write this one  
20 down: bring a phone and de-bug it. Okay.

21 MR. SCHNEIDER: Okay.

22 JIM: And I'll check on the dogs.

23 MR. SCHNEIDER: Okay, thanks.

24 JIM: Okay. See you, Steve.

25 MR. SCHNEIDER: Yeah, bye-bye.

(Phones hung up.)

(Telephone ringing)

SITA: Hello?

HENRY: Hello, Rachel? Hello, Rachel?

SITA: It's not Rachel.

HENRY: Who is this?

SITA: Who is this, please?

HENRY: Who is this?

SITA: Sita.

HENRY: Sita, this is Henry. How are you?

SITA: Henry?

HENRY: Um-hum.

SITA: Hi.

HENRY: How are you?

SITA: I'm doing fine.

HENRY: Okay.

SITA: Huh?

HENRY: You don't sound like you're real

sure.

SITA: I don't know.

HENRY: Are you anxious to see your, your  
children? Are you, are you --

SITA: I just want --

HENRY: -- a little bit down on that?

SITA: I'm just anxious this thing to get  
over.

1 HENRY: Sure, well, that makes sense. That  
2 makes a lot of sense. I know you have concerns, I know  
3 your, your primary concerns have to be with your  
4 children. I think that they're, you know, in foster  
5 care and I think that should be good, you know, in good  
6 shape, but of course you're going to miss them.

7 SITA: What?

8 HENRY: I'm saying that they're in good shape  
9 and I know being a good parent, you have to be  
10 concerned about them.

11 SITA: I'm sorry, can you speak a little bit  
12 -- I can't hardly hear you.

13 HENRY: Okay. Hold on a second. I'm saying  
14 being a good parent, you must be concerned about them.

15 SITA: Well, I try, try to be a good parent,  
16 but --

17 HENRY: Well, I'm sure that you are, I'm sure  
18 that you are. Kids are very important to all of us.  
19 Family is very important. Anybody that's a good  
20 Christian has a, has a sincere interest in seeing that,  
21 that the welfare of their children is, is, you know, is  
22 taken care of.

23 SITA: Well, what I have heard on the radio  
24 really, I don't know if I did the right thing.

25 HENRY: Of course you did the right thing.  
You know, as, as --

1                   SITA: I know they're safe out there, but the  
2 way I heard on the radio the way they've been treated,  
3 it really -- oh, God.

4                   HENRY: Well, I think you're just in a  
5 difficult position and as a good parent you have to do  
6 whatever you feel is the best thing for your, for your  
7 kids. Sometimes decisions are difficult to make but I  
8 think you're trying to put yourself in a, in a  
9 situation of what is the best thing for my kids and I  
10 think that you've done that and I think that that's  
11 good.

12                   SITA: I thought so when I heard all the  
13 comments where are they going and they're putting --  
14 they're questioning them --I heard so much different --  
15 I heard so much different kind of news on the radio and  
16 I don't know what to believe, if you guys going to keep  
17 my kids safe and not to harass them.

18                   HENRY: Well, I don't think that anybody  
19 wants their kids to be harassed, I'm sure that you  
20 don't. And as you say, you want this, you want this  
21 whole thing to end so that you can be reunited with  
22 your kids. I think that that's what everybody wants  
23 and I think that that's, you know, that's what's going  
24 to happen. One of the things that I want you to  
25 realize though --

                  SITA: That's what I, I wrote on my -- hello?

1 HENRY: Yes?

2 SITA: Hello?

3 HENRY: Yes, I can hear you. I think that  
4 that cord that you have is -- you know, if you move the  
5 phone something happens, I'm not sure exactly what.

6 SITA: Yeah.

7 HENRY: Well, you know, the, the, the news  
8 media speculates a lot. They guess, you know, and  
9 surmise that things might be happening, but they don't  
10 really know what's going on, you know, honestly they  
11 don't. You know, they, they need to say something and  
12 I'd say at least 50 percent of the time they're wrong.  
13 They're just speculating, they're guessing. They're  
14 trying to make a story sound interesting, they're  
15 trying to sell news.

16 SITA: Well, that's -- I used to believe the  
17 news --

18 HENRY: Well --

19 SITA: -- and the radio, but what I've been  
20 hearing and what I saw --

21 HENRY: Um-hum.

22 SITA: -- it doesn't -- it's giving me so  
23 much negative right now.

24 HENRY: Well, I think that that gives you a  
25 perspective, a true perspective on what is true and  
what is not true; that is, because you're having a

1 first-hand experience in dealing with the news media.  
2 We see it, you know, working in law enforcement and  
3 people, you know, say why don't you tell the news media  
4 everything that's going on, they need to know? But a  
5 lot of the times they speculate anyway. So you wonder,  
6 you know, is it helpful or is it not helpful. We  
7 believe that in a situation like this when people's  
8 lives are at stake, you know, when people have  
9 concerns, people like yourself, who is forced to be in  
10 a position where you're separated from your kids, you  
11 know, we feel that it's in your best interest and  
12 everybody's best interest that a lot of information  
13 doesn't get out. You know, because you're concerned  
14 and because you are a good parent, we would like to see  
15 you come out, but --

16 SITA: Well --

17 HENRY: -- of course that's up to you and  
18 that's a decision that's -- that -- it's a difficult  
19 decision, it's a very troubling decision because you  
20 have a situation of having to make a, a, a choice and  
21 it's a difficult choice. Your loyalties are with your  
22 children but they're also with the family that you're  
23 with at this time.

24 SITA: That's one thing I, -- that's one  
25 thing I just wrote my, my parents-in-law's name so that  
I'll know they'll be safe.



1 HENRY: Uh-huh, uh-huh, well --

2 SITA: But I'm hearing they're going to the  
3 social worker or foster home, they're going there, over  
4 here -- here and there.

5 HENRY: Well --

6 SITA: And those, those -- that -- what car  
7 trailers came in --

8 HENRY: Um-hum.

9 SITA: -- it's unbelievable. It's like just  
10 -- I can only see this in a movie.

11 HENRY: Okay. One of the things that, you  
12 know, it's like you say, you know, you can't believe  
13 everything that you hear in the media because a lot of  
14 that information is incorrect. They're speculating.  
15 You know, some of the information that, that the news  
16 media has broadcast about David and about all of you is  
17 not true. Isn't that so?

18 SITA: When they talk to David --

19 HENRY: Um-hum.

20 SITA: -- they can change or manipulate what  
21 he said.

22 HENRY: There you go, there you go, that's  
23 exactly what I'm talking about.

24 SITA: But there is no connection with them  
25 right now.

HENRY: That's right, that's right, there

1 isn't.

2 SITA: There's no connection.

3 HENRY: Exactly.

4 SITA: So how can -- I guess I -- Steve just  
5 walked in. Do you want to talk to him?

6 HENRY: Well, I'd like to finish talking to  
7 you if I could. I will talk to Steve, we -- you know,  
8 but not in a hurry for, for anything. You know, I have  
9 a concern about you. I feel that you're a sincere  
10 person and you have a great, strong, sincere, keen  
11 interest in your children and I'd like --

12 SITA: Strong? I wasn't -- I am always on  
13 the background before, always. I didn't want to make  
14 no trouble, I --

15 HENRY: I understand. I understand.

16 SITA: I'm alone and stuff.

17 HENRY: And being alone --

18 SITA: Not alone, but --

19 HENRY: In terms -- and when I say --

20 SITA: What's going on now.

21 HENRY: I mean separated from your children.  
22 It's, it's a difficult thing, you know? Family to, to  
23 somebody like yourself and to a lot of us is, is the  
24 most important and the number one thing, okay? And we  
25 want you, and we want everybody, to be reunited with  
their loved ones as soon as possible. I know that,

1 that David feels that, that he's in a situation where  
2 he has to follow the course that he has chosen and to  
3 see this thing through, you know, and everybody is  
4 being as patient. You are, Steve, is, the children  
5 are, you know, and there are certain needs that have to  
6 be addressed. Everybody still has to eat and life  
7 still has to go on and your children need you and you  
8 need your children. That doesn't mean that you don't  
9 need Steve, you know.

10 SITA: No, I don't need Steve.

11 HENRY: I'm sorry, you need Steve and you  
12 need David and you need everybody because they're part  
13 of your family. But your children have a, a direct  
14 link to you because they're your kids and I know that  
15 you feel that very strong, strong obligation and love  
16 and, and because of that love, those children need to  
17 be nurtured by you and we want that for you, okay? So  
18 if you are -- if you feel that you can leave, we want  
19 to help, we want to help you bridge that gap so that  
20 you can as a matter of fact be reunited with your  
21 children.

22 SITA: Just a minute, please.

23 HENRY: Okay.

24 SITA: Hello?

25 HENRY: Hello? Hello?

SITA: Just a -- hello?

1 HENRY: Yes? Can you hear me?

2 SITA: Hello?

3 HENRY: Yes?

4 SITA: Just a minute. I can't hear him.  
5 Something is wrong with the phone.

6 MR. SCHNEIDER: Hello?

7 HENRY: Hello.

8 MR. SCHNEIDER: Henry?

9 HENRY: Can you hear me, Steve?

10 MR. SCHNEIDER: Yeah.

11 HENRY: How are you?

12 MR. SCHNEIDER: Not to bad, how about  
13 yourself?

14 HENRY: I'm doing okay.

15 MR. SCHNEIDER: Good.

16 HENRY: I don't know if she was moving the  
17 cord or something but we, we were having some --

18 MR. SCHNEIDER: Problems.

19 HENRY: -- some static, yeah, and then she  
20 couldn't hear me.

21 MR. SCHNEIDER: Yeah, that happened -- every  
22 now and then it happens. I'm not sure --

23 HENRY: Yeah.

24 MR. SCHNEIDER: -- earlier when we were  
25 talking with Jim he said it was his end but I don't  
know, it sounded like it was over here this time. I

1 | don't know.

2 |           HENRY: Yeah.

3 |           MR. SCHNEIDER: Oh, shoot. Hello?

4 |           HENRY: Hello?

5 |           MR. SCHNEIDER: Is that your end or mine?

6 |           HENRY: I think it's your end.

7 |           MR. SCHNEIDER: What on -- because I'm not  
8 | even moving here, that's why -- I'm looking right on  
9 | through.

10 |           HENRY: Uh-huh.

11 |           MR. SCHNEIDER: We've got the wires in a  
12 | place now where, you know, you can't -- no one can  
13 | touch it so I don't quite -- that's, that's, that's  
14 | strange. Let me take a look.

15 |           HENRY: Yeah.

16 |           MR. SCHNEIDER: Okay. Yeah, no one's even  
17 | moving here --

18 |           HENRY: Okay.

19 |           MR. SCHNEIDER: -- near the line.

20 |           HENRY: Uh-huh.

21 |           MR. SCHNEIDER:. Okay. What can we do now?  
22 | Where are we at?

23 |           HENRY: Well, where we're at is this. I, I,  
24 | I talked to --

25 |           MR. SCHNEIDER: You probably spent some time  
with Jim then, huh?

1 HENRY: Uh-huh, yes --

2 MR. SCHNEIDER: Okay.

3 HENRY: -- I did. And Jim's been working on  
4 trying to see if we can get those -- get you some kind  
5 of a waiver so you can go ahead and, and take care of  
6 the dogs. I think we, we probably will try to do that,  
7 you know, in -- going into tomorrow in the daylight.

8 MR. SCHNEIDER: All right.

9 HENRY: Okay?

10 MR. SCHNEIDER: That makes sense.

11 HENRY: Are we ready to get some more kids  
12 out?

13 MR. SCHNEIDER: Jim -- in fact, the truth is  
14 he talked almost the whole day right until I would  
15 imagine an hour or so ago with David.

16 HENRY: Um-hum.

17 MR. SCHNEIDER: From what I understand he  
18 spent a lot of time on the phone with him.

19 HENRY: Yeah, and it's my understanding that  
20 David was, was going to be sending -- continue sending  
21 out some, some kids.

22 MR. SCHNEIDER: Is that right?

23 HENRY: Yes.

24 MR. SCHNEIDER: See, I -- yeah, I don't know  
25 anything about it because most of the day I have been  
helping a couple of people out here and --

1 HENRY: Okay. One of the things I want to  
2 caution you about --

3 MR. SCHNEIDER: Yeah.

4 HENRY: -- and I, and I wanted to talk to you  
5 about, and that is we need to ensure that if anybody  
6 does walk out, you know, that they're not armed, okay?

7 MR. SCHNEIDER: Right.

8 HENRY: We don't want -- and see, and that's  
9 why we want to do the -- or we want to try to see about  
10 handling of those burial of those dogs tomorrow during  
11 the daylight because we don't want anybody to confuse  
12 those shovels with weapons.

13 MR. SCHNEIDER: Uh-huh.

14 HENRY: You know? So --

15 MR. SCHNEIDER: If -- you know, if you don't  
16 mind me saying so, it seems kind of -- it, it seems  
17 funny because of, you know, like a tank with men  
18 sitting inside it not that far away and, and here's  
19 maybe a --

20 HENRY: We, we, we just don't want any --

21 MR. SCHNEIDER: No, I -- believe me --

22 HENRY: -- you know, we, we've worked so  
23 hard, you know.

24 MR. SCHNEIDER: Well, but look at this  
25 though, Henry, look at this --

HENRY: Yes, yes.

1 MR. SCHNEIDER: -- you know, on that day  
2 Sunday when that happened --

3 HENRY: Uh-huh.

4 MR. SCHNEIDER: -- I mean that started so  
5 fast. I was down at the end of, of this building and  
6 I'm, "What on earth is going on?" I'm talking to  
7 someone.

8 HENRY: Sure, sure.

9 MR. SCHNEIDER: We hit the phone 911  
10 immediately --

11 HENRY: Sure.

12 MR. SCHNEIDER: -- and started -- Wayne  
13 Martin the attorney and me started screaming --

14 HENRY: Uh-huh.

15 MR. SCHNEIDER: -- we said -- and this Lynch  
16 got on the phone and we started saying, "What is going  
17 on?" And he identified himself, Wayne did, we started  
18 screaming, get involved, you know, call this off --

19 HENRY: Um-hum.

20 MR. SCHNEIDER: -- there's women and  
21 children --

22 HENRY: Um-hum.

23 MR. SCHNEIDER: -- what happened to  
24 communication?

25 HENRY: Um-hum.

MR. SCHNEIDER: So from that time after I



1 mean, everything since then -- I, I was going to say  
2 something about it, I can't remember what it was, oh  
3 yeah, when the part came when --after about an hour and  
4 a half of that kind of nonsense, then of course the  
5 negotiations started about you people being able to  
6 come on and get those that were wounded. Well, we were  
7 all for that --

8 HENRY: Um-hum.

9 MR. SCHNEIDER: -- and we kept on assuring  
10 and reassuring and, and more than --

11 HENRY: Uh-huh.

12 MR. SCHNEIDER: And of course, and when the  
13 time was when your men were standing out there -- one  
14 of the guys just told me today there were 25 guys out  
15 there that could have been picked off.

16 HENRY: Yeah.

17 MR. SCHNEIDER: But we're not into that,  
18 never. Nobody here has ever shot. No one's been in  
19 any war. No one's been in like Vietnam or anything  
20 like that.

21 HENRY: I understand.

22 MR. SCHNEIDER: So I mean, the truth of the  
23 matter is, you know, we're not out there to harm  
24 people, yourself or anybody that's sent out here, I  
25 mean, not, not in the least.

HENRY: Okay. I understand that.

1 MR. SCHNEIDER: So, I mean, but if you guys -  
2 - if you're, if you're concerned about somebody coming  
3 out with a shovel and, I mean --

4 HENRY: Well --

5 MR. SCHNEIDER: -- at times I'll tell you  
6 what, I mean, it seems almost absurd though.

7 HENRY: Well, but, but, but that's just in  
8 the evening hours. We'll, we'll work through this  
9 tomorrow --

10 MR. SCHNEIDER: Okay.

11 HENRY: -- during the daylight.

12 MR. SCHNEIDER: I mean, I'm just talking  
13 about myself. Don't --

14 HENRY: Yes.

15 MR. SCHNEIDER: -- don't get, you know --  
16 overall I guess, you know, I -- it's -- you know, after  
17 all this time I guess one just wonders at the time  
18 where, where all this is going to and --

19 HENRY: Um-hum. We just, we just want to  
20 make sure that there's no accidents, that nobody has a  
21 question about anything.

22 MR. SCHNEIDER: Oh yeah, I understand, I  
23 understand.

24 HENRY: And, and I appreciate your  
25 cooperation on this -- I appreciate --

MR. SCHNEIDER: Oh yeah, you know I would do

1 any -- whatever, whatever --

2 HENRY: -- your working with me.

3 MR. SCHNEIDER: -- will help and make the  
4 matters easier, whatever else, you know, I'll always  
5 work with that.

6 HENRY: Okay.

7 MR. SCHNEIDER: So --

8 HENRY: Can you check on that, Steve, for me?  
9 You know, maybe I can continue talking to Sita while  
10 you check on that, see if we can get a couple more kids  
11 out?

12 MR. SCHNEIDER: Well, see, the whole -- what,  
13 what actually was all said then with David because now  
14 you know the guy --

15 HENRY: David said --

16 MR. SCHNEIDER: Why is he going -- now he  
17 passes out on me.

18 HENRY: He passed out?

19 MR. SCHNEIDER: Well, you know, he's sleeping  
20 again. He, he's been awake all this time. I just, I  
21 just came down to see him and now I came, I was going  
22 to ask him a few questions and the guy's out again.  
23 But he was awake the entire day so maybe --

24 HENRY: Okay.

25 MR. SCHNEIDER: -- so maybe he's just taking  
a -- I, I hope -- I'm hoping here he's just taking a

1 short nap.

2 HENRY: How is he in terms of his medication  
3 condition?

4 MR. SCHNEIDER: You know, it's remarkable.  
5 It's like the guy he -- well, I don't know what Jim  
6 told you, but when I came to talk with him, he was  
7 talking with Jim on the phone --

8 HENRY: Um-hum.

9 MR. SCHNEIDER: I was amazed at how he was  
10 sitting up, talking, the strength in his voice and he  
11 seems to be recovering.

12 HENRY: Good, good.

13 MR. SCHNEIDER: So, I mean, it's, it's quite  
14 amazing. Just like the other night when you were  
15 asking -- was that last night you were asking about  
16 blood pressure and --

17 HENRY: Um-hum.

18 MR. SCHNEIDER: -- and it was 120 over --

19 HENRY: Yes.

20 MR. SCHNEIDER: Yeah, I mean I about fell  
21 over myself.

22 HENRY: That's great, that's great.

23 MR. SCHNEIDER: So it appears like he's  
24 recovering and, and --

25 HENRY: Uh-huh.

MR. SCHNEIDER: -- quite rapidly, I mean --

1 HENRY: Good.

2 MR. SCHNEIDER: -- and there's no question he  
3 took some pretty good hits.

4 HENRY: Okay. Sure. Yes.

5 MR. SCHNEIDER: But --

6 HENRY: Okay. Can we get a couple of more  
7 kids? What do you think, Steve?

8 MR. SCHNEIDER: Well, I -- see, the -- what  
9 the bottom line is, it has really nothing to do with  
10 me.

11 HENRY: I understand, but it was our  
12 agreement with David that he was going to continue  
13 this.

14 MR. SCHNEIDER: Well, if that's -- you know,  
15 if that's what he says I don't see why not.

16 HENRY: Okay, okay. Well, you know, we, we  
17 want to continue. See, when we, when we spoke  
18 yesterday, when I, when I talked to you, I felt that we  
19 had had a setback and --

20 MR. SCHNEIDER: Uh-huh.

21 HENRY: -- I think that, and I think that,  
22 that David is trying to do the right thing, you know,  
23 and that's why I think he's starting to give us some  
24 more kids and I think that that's, that that's worth  
25 while and I think we're -- we get into a situation  
where we're able to, to tell our bosses look, you know,

1 he is sincere. He's told us, you know, that he's going  
2 to do this and he is sincere. He's not ready for this  
3 or not ready for that, but he is continuing to show his  
4 good faith by doing this and that and the other. We  
5 want to continue in that, in that vein because we are  
6 able to, you know, to give you things, for example, in  
7 terms of burying the dogs or, or whatever. It's, it's,  
8 it's good for us, you know, and it puts us in a  
9 position if we had to do something because of an  
10 emergency situation that occurred there, it gives us a,  
11 a situation of being able to tell our boss look --

12 MR. SCHNEIDER: You know, this almost seems  
13 like a dream to me just sitting here listening to you.

14 HENRY: I know it, I know it.

15 MR. SCHNEIDER: I mean, to think that you're  
16 giving me an opportunity to bury dogs. It almost  
17 sounds absurd, you know, when I think back where I was,  
18 you know, not too long ago and what was happening.

19 HENRY: Yes, um-hum.

20 MR. SCHNEIDER: Here I'm sitting in a  
21 building now and it just seems crazy.

22 HENRY: Yeah.

23 MR. SCHNEIDER: You know, I mean it's like  
24 your, your gift to me or your giving me some kind of a  
25 treat here and I --

HENRY: I know.

1 MR. SCHNEIDER: -- I have the opportunity to  
2 bury a decaying dog, you know, that --

3 HENRY: Yes.

4 MR. SCHNEIDER: But anyway, you know, really  
5 it doesn't -- you know, I'm, I'm going to try to do  
6 everything I can, like I've always told you, Henry --

7 HENRY: Um-hum.

8 MR. SCHNEIDER: -- and you know, if it was up  
9 to me, I would do -- you know, it -- I just want this  
10 over, just okay, let's do this and be done with it. We  
11 don't need their single file. We don't need to do  
12 whatever, just here we are, you know, let's get this  
13 thing settled and done with and --

14 HENRY: And where are we with that, Steve?  
15 Do you think that we're making progress in terms of is,  
16 is -- do you see -- do you get a sense that, that David  
17 is, you know, moving in that direction, is anything  
18 coming to him that you feel is --

19 MR. SCHNEIDER: I really -- Henry, I really  
20 don't know, I don't know. I mean, I think so, it seems  
21 that way --

22 HENRY: Okay.

23 MR. SCHNEIDER: -- but --

24 HENRY: Okay.

25 MR. SCHNEIDER: -- truthfully, you know, like  
when he said wait and then last night, you know, you're

1 talking to me with all the arguments you had and from  
2 the perspective and so forth which I understand, I'd be  
3 doing the same thing in your shoes.

4 HENRY: Um-hum.

5 MR. SCHNEIDER: And in honesty, from the way  
6 I view things here, I don't know, I really don't know.  
7 You know, I mean, you know, I would -- I'm hoping so --

8 HENRY: Uh-huh.

9 MR. SCHNEIDER: -- but when he says wait, I'm  
10 wondering myself inside well, what does that mean, how  
11 long and -- how long are we going to be sitting here  
12 and so --

13 HENRY: Yeah, well, we agree -- you and I  
14 agreed for sure last night that it was not going to be  
15 2,000 years, right?

16 MR. SCHNEIDER: That's one thing we did agree  
17 on.

18 HENRY: Okay.

19 MR. SCHNEIDER: That's right. That lightens  
20 up things for sure.

21 HENRY: Yeah. Well, you know --

22 MR. SCHNEIDER: (Laughter)

23 HENRY: -- we, want to make sure that, you  
24 know, that --

25 MR. SCHNEIDER: Henry, you have a sense of  
humor, huh?



1 HENRY: (Laughter) Well, a little bit.

2 MR. SCHNEIDER: Okay.

3 HENRY: A little bit.

4 MR. SCHNEIDER: I think I would too if I was  
5 over with you on that side talking to some people over  
6 here.

7 HENRY: Yeah. Well, we, we want to -- we --  
8 I want to work with you, Steve, you know, in terms of  
9 the children. I, I have a concern. I know that, that  
10 David came around on that issue. He wasn't -- I know  
11 he had a concern about some things but we worked  
12 through that through Jim and, and that's why, you know,  
13 we were able to --

14 MR. SCHNEIDER: Oh, I know -- wait, what's  
15 going on? Is someone stepping on the line?

16 HENRY: Not here. I don't know about there.

17 MR. SCHNEIDER: No, I'm talking over here.

18 HENRY: Oh, okay.

19 MR. SCHNEIDER: I just looked over at someone  
20 here. It's got to be something like that when it --  
21 that that happens.

22 HENRY: It's, it's important -- you know,  
23 it's important for us, really, I mean it really is. It  
24 may not seem like that, but it's important for us to,  
25 to continue this spirit of cooperation, it really is,  
you know? And, and, you know --

1 MR. SCHNEIDER: Well, yeah, you know, if I --  
2 definitely, I mean, especially like to think a lot of  
3 my life I've counseled so many people from so many  
4 walks of life and all age groups and here I'm speaking  
5 to someone, you know, a negotiator myself now and it  
6 seems so strange to be listening to you when I've used  
7 those same arguments and so forth and --

8 HENRY: Um-hum.

9 MR. SCHNEIDER: -- and I'd like to just say  
10 let's cut all the surface nonsense and here's what it  
11 is and --

12 HENRY: Exactly.

13 MR. SCHNEIDER: But, you know, and that's the  
14 way I am, always have been, and --

15 HENRY: Um-hum.

16 MR. SCHNEIDER: -- you know, when you give  
17 your word, you follow it through. That's why I feel  
18 like, you know, I'm in the -- I'm, I'm tied and I'm  
19 between a hard place and a rock.

20 HENRY: Um-hum, and I feel that, that I'm in  
21 the same position and I, you know --

22 MR. SCHNEIDER: I mean, you know, a lot of  
23 things of course have passed through one's mind being  
24 out here in a, in a predicament like this. But I was,  
25 I was asking you, we were talking last night about some  
individuals, what happened to them and so forth. I

1 gave you their names and you wanted to use that as a  
2 bargaining chip as I recall.

3 HENRY: I didn't want to use anything as a  
4 bargaining chip. What, what I did is because you  
5 expressed a concern, I went to the bosses.

6 MR. SCHNEIDER: Okay.

7 HENRY: Now, I was told that because of the  
8 step that we had had that we --

9 MR. SCHNEIDER: I recall.

10 HENRY: -- that, that, that they felt that we  
11 had, that we had regressed in our position in terms of  
12 the progress that we were making, that we had been put  
13 in a position where the bosses now did not want to  
14 cooperate. I think what has happened is David has  
15 taken a, a real good position and I think that he's --  
16 you know, one of the things that he did is he sent I  
17 think one of the kids, Mark, out.

18 MR. SCHNEIDER: Yeah, he did, yeah.

19 HENRY: Okay? And we've been trying to tell  
20 the bosses here, I know Jim has and I know I have --

21 MR. SCHNEIDER: Were you around earlier then  
22 when that was taking place or --

23 HENRY: Yes.

24 MR. SCHNEIDER: You were, okay.

25 HENRY: Yes. And it -- so long as we  
continue that, then when you ask a question, then it's

1 very easy for me to, to respond to you and we -- as I  
2 said, we want to continue having this good cooperation,  
3 spirit of, of being able to work with one another. It  
4 has nothing to do with, with trying to use something as  
5 a bargaining chip or anything like that, you know, and,  
6 and I'm glad that -- you know, and I, I have no, I have  
7 no problems in, in furnish you any of that information.  
8 As a matter of fact, you know, I'd, I'd look forward to  
9 when this thing is all over to meeting you.

10 MR. SCHNEIDER: Right. Well, you know, it's  
11 mutual, it really is. I'm -- you know, I'm curious to  
12 see who I've been speaking to all this time, you know,  
13 hours through the night, through the day --

14 HENRY: Um-hum.

15 MR. SCHNEIDER: -- through the night --

16 HENRY: Um-hum.

17 MR. SCHNEIDER: -- under such strange  
18 circumstances. It might not be -- there we go again.

19 HENRY: Yes. Well, let me, let me ask you  
20 this. Is, is -- are, are the people there -- you know,  
21 when we spoke, everybody was dressed and ready to come  
22 out yesterday. Do you sense that, that we're in that  
23 posture again or did we --

24 MR. SCHNEIDER: Hello?

25 HENRY: Hello?

MR. SCHNEIDER: Yeah, okay.

1                   HENRY: Do you sense that we're in that same  
2 posture or do you sense that we're, that we're going to  
3 wait for, for a while? Geez, I don't know what the  
4 matter with that --

5                   MR. SCHNEIDER: Oh, there's -- I don't  
6 understand what's happening with this phone now.

7                   HENRY: Um-hum.

8                   MR. SCHNEIDER: Do you hear that clicking?

9                   HENRY: Yes.

10                  MR. SCHNEIDER: It's like it cuts out. I'm  
11 not sure what that's from.

12                  HENRY: Yeah.

13                  MR. SCHNEIDER: I do think so. In fact, I  
14 know so.

15                  HENRY: Okay, good.

16                  MR. SCHNEIDER: Yeah.

17                  HENRY: Good.

18                  MR. SCHNEIDER: But, you know, it's strange  
19 when a -- when you -- when it's, when it's a wait thing  
20 and your, yourself wondering well, how long or what,  
21 what kind of time frame? Like you said, as long --

22                  HENRY: Uh-huh.

23                  MR. SCHNEIDER: -- as it's not 2,000 years.

24                  HENRY: Yes.

25                  MR. SCHNEIDER: You know, I mean, that's  
about the way it is with anybody, but --

1 HENRY: Um-hum.

2 MR. SCHNEIDER: -- yeah, the same. Nothing  
3 has changed about that at all. In fact, I didn't hear  
4 -- I know it was a long -- or seemed like a -- somewhat  
5 of a lengthy conversation that David had with Jim  
6 because I walked to where he was, went away, came back  
7 some time later a few different times and he was still  
8 on the phone with them. So apparently it, it sounded  
9 to me in the little bits and pieces I got at that time  
10 like it was, it was still going.

11 HENRY: Um-hum.

12 MR. SCHNEIDER: And I guess -- but other --  
13 you know, I didn't, I didn't hear it all, I didn't get  
14 to talk to him. By the time I did get back to where he  
15 was here he was sleeping and has been since.

16 HENRY: Okay, okay.

17 MR. SCHNEIDER: Yeah.

18 HENRY: Well, I -- you know --

19 MR. SCHNEIDER: What -- being that you were  
20 there, what did he say then to Jim? I mean, okay, Mark  
21 went out there. Was -- what was after that or what was  
22 --

23 HENRY: Well, I think after that I don't know  
24 that he talked to, to, to David. I think he spoke to -  
25 - well, he did speak to, to David. He spoke to Sita,  
too.

1 MR. SCHNEIDER: Okay.

2 HENRY: And I think Sita wants to come out  
3 but she's torn because she doesn't want to, she doesn't  
4 want to feel that she's abandoning the extended family,  
5 but at the -- (tape ends abruptly)

6 (Tape 32)

7 HENRY: God, that's awful. Hello?

8 MR. SCHNEIDER: What is going on here? What  
9 kind of a phone is this I wonder? Hello?

10 HENRY: Yes?

11 MR. SCHNEIDER: What's happening?

12 HENRY: I don't have any idea.

13 MR. SCHNEIDER: No, I'm talking to someone  
14 right here. Yeah, that's -- okay. Man, that is a  
15 terrible phone.

16 HENRY: It is.

17 MR. SCHNEIDER: Here, hand it to me. That's  
18 the thing right there, that black cord. Hang on.

19 HENRY: Okay.

20 (Baby crying in background.)

21 MR. SCHNEIDER: Boy, this thing cuts out  
22 easy.

23 HENRY: It sure does.

24 MR. SCHNEIDER: Hello?

25 HENRY: Yes.

MR. SCHNEIDER: Okay, okay. Now, where was

1 I? Yeah. Okay. I got to talk to just a few people  
2 and then I came -- well, by the time I came back,  
3 that's when I noticed he was sleeping and I started  
4 talking with Sita a little bit and about that time you  
5 called.

6 HENRY: Okay, okay.

7 MR. SCHNEIDER: So, what did -- what was she  
8 saying then?

9 HENRY: Well, I think she's torn and I think  
10 she wants to come out --

11 MR. SCHNEIDER: Okay, yeah.

12 HENRY: -- but she doesn't want to feel that  
13 she's abandoning, abandoning the group. She would like  
14 --

15 MR. SCHNEIDER: Well, you know, no one --  
16 I'll, I'll tell you honestly, no one ever under any  
17 circumstance would ever put pressure on her -- don't do  
18 it, or this.

19 HENRY: Sure.

20 MR. SCHNEIDER: I mean, I could start giving  
21 you a list of names, people that have been with us that  
22 are not with us --

23 HENRY: Um-hum.

24 MR. SCHNEIDER: -- you could go talk to them.

25 HENRY: Sure.

MR. SCHNEIDER: That's what I mean. Even



1 | financially speaking, there have been people that have  
2 | come to us without a job or money.

3 |           HENRY: Uh-huh.

4 |           MR. SCHNEIDER: We show them these things.  
5 | They don't have a way back so we have given them money  
6 | and a place to stay like even a motel or to make sure -

7 | -

8 |           HENRY: Uh-huh.

9 |           MR. SCHNEIDER: -- they've got a place.

10 |          HENRY: Uh-huh.

11 |          MR. SCHNEIDER: Because number one, I mean  
12 | for whatever Christianity is, you should not have to  
13 | pay for a truth or for some understanding of something

14 | --

15 |          HENRY: Right.

16 |          MR. SCHNEIDER: -- that is already free.

17 |          HENRY: Right.

18 |          MR. SCHNEIDER: So that's why, you know, with  
19 | anybody here he constantly asks me to mention to these  
20 | people does anybody want to go, who wants to go next?

21 |          HENRY: Okay.

22 |          MR. SCHNEIDER: So, but I have -- I haven't  
23 | done that today. I only talked to a couple of people.

24 |          HENRY: Okay.

25 |          MR. SCHNEIDER: It was already toward the  
latter part of that conversation and --

1 HENRY: Okay. Can I ask you to do that? Can  
2 you, can you give me any other kids --

3 MR. SCHNEIDER: Yeah, I will.

4 HENRY: -- or, you know, and, you know --

5 MR. SCHNEIDER: Well, I'll try to do that. I  
6 don't --

7 HENRY: Okay.

8 MR. SCHNEIDER: I don't -- see, I've never  
9 had a part directly with, you know, like choosing who  
10 or any like with the children.

11 HENRY: Okay.

12 MR. SCHNEIDER: It's usually the mothers,  
13 between him asking them or do you want to and how about  
14 if these two or whatever, see?

15 HENRY: Um-hum.

16 MR. SCHNEIDER: So I've not -- even though  
17 I've been observing and so forth, I've not really  
18 talked to any of them or never have I coerced either --  
19 any of them in any --

20 HENRY: Sure.

21 MR. SCHNEIDER: -- you know, which direction,  
22 so --

23 HENRY: Sure. Can --

24 MR. SCHNEIDER: -- so --

25 HENRY: -- can I ask you to follow through on  
that, if you could, for me, Steve?

1 MR. SCHNEIDER: Oh yeah, I will, byou know,  
2 I'll do that for sure.

3 HENRY: Maybe what I can do is I can -- if,  
4 if we can maybe I can talk to, to Sita and, and maybe  
5 in the mean time you can find out if, if somebody else  
6 wants to come out. Could, could we work on that?

7 MR. SCHNEIDER: Yeah. It'd sure be a lot --  
8 I, I wish we could have called or caught David when he  
9 was awake like when Jim had him on the phone. I wish  
10 you would have gotten him to say well, who after him or  
11 something of that nature. Then it's easy for me, there  
12 is no problem.

13 HENRY: Okay.

14 MR. SCHNEIDER: Do you know what I mean?

15 HENRY: Yes. Well, one of the things that  
16 we --

17 MR. SCHNEIDER: What, what did -- I mean, you  
18 were there probably -- how long were you around that  
19 conversation when it was going on?

20 HENRY: Not, not all of it. I, I came, you  
21 know, when he was --

22 MR. SCHNEIDER: Yeah.

23 HENRY: -- already involved in a conversation  
24 with her, heard part of that conversation.

25 MR. SCHNEIDER: Uh-huh.

MR. HENRY: And I know she was -- you know,

1 she was breaking up because, you know, because --

2 MR. SCHNEIDER: Right.

3 HENRY: -- she's thinking of the separation  
4 with her kids.

5 MR. SCHNEIDER: Exactly.

6 HENRY: And one of the things that we would  
7 like is, you know, we want to make sure that she feels  
8 comfortable and if she wants to -- in addition to  
9 talking to, to her kids she can maybe touch base with  
10 the other women that, that have come out and anybody  
11 else that she wants to talk to.

12 MR. SCHNEIDER: Uh-huh.

13 HENRY: You know? Or let me ask you this.

14 MR. SCHNEIDER: Sure.

15 HENRY: Is the decision-making process there  
16 such that, that we'll have to wait for, for David? In  
17 other words, are you in a position --

18 MR. SCHNEIDER: Usually, in honesty, it is.

19 HENRY: Okay. So, you would not be in a  
20 position where you could make the decision?

21 MR. SCHNEIDER: That -- see, that's why, why  
22 I told you like even last night being between the hard  
23 place and the rock even with --

24 HENRY: Yeah.

25 MR. SCHNEIDER: -- something like that.

HENRY: Okay.

1 MR. SCHNEIDER: Because, you know, you see,  
2 the thing is, I can teach the Bible to some degree but  
3 they see him opening up this book. He can answer any  
4 question by going back to the book.

5 HENRY: Um-hum.

6 MR. SCHNEIDER: So they've come not to meet a  
7 Steve, but to meet this guy David who has this ability.  
8 And so in the process that's why like when it comes to  
9 the children and all that going, I mean he's wanting to  
10 encourage a lot of them --

11 HENRY: Um-hum.

12 MR. SCHNEIDER: -- and he really hits them  
13 pretty hard about going.

14 HENRY: Yes.

15 MR. SCHNEIDER: And -- but he doesn't -- he,  
16 he won't push them, you know, he has them look, you  
17 know, at the situation and, you know, they're your  
18 children, you can go, don't, you know, don't stay  
19 because of a group, if -- I mean, or any other reason  
20 other than, you know, here's your family and so forth,  
21 think about the situation you're in, what's best for  
22 you and, you know, these are the things he's asked  
23 them.

24 HENRY: Okay. Well, good, maybe we can,  
25 maybe we can, you know, even if, if he's asleep if you  
can continue in that same vein and see if any of them

1 want to decide or make a decision.

2 MR. SCHNEIDER: Well, I'll -- sure, I'll go  
3 around and ask.

4 HENRY: Okay, okay. Well, I'll tell you this  
5 --

6 MR. SCHNEIDER: Okay.

7 HENRY: -- why, don't I ask you to do that  
8 and I'll call you back in a little bit?

9 MR. SCHNEIDER: All right.

10 HENRY: Okay?

11 MR. SCHNEIDER: Sure.

12 HENRY: Okay. Well, I'll call you back in  
13 just a little bit.

14 MR. SCHNEIDER: Talk to you later, Henry.

15 HENRY: Okay.

16 MR. SCHNEIDER: Okay, bye.

17 HENRY: Bye-bye.

18 (Phones hung up) (Phone ringing)

19 \* \* \* \* \*

20 RACHEL: Hello?

21 HENRY: Hi.

22 RACHEL: Hi.

23 HENRY: Who is this?

24 RACHEL: Rachel.

25 HENRY: Rachel, how are you?

RACHEL: Fine.

1 HENRY: Is David around, please?

2 RACHEL: Just a minute. Steve around? Let  
3 me go get Steve.

4 (Baby crying in background.)

5 RACHEL: David's sleeping so I'm going to go  
6 get Steve, okay?

7 HENRY: God, he's been sleeping forever.

8 RACHEL: Why, was he sleeping the last time  
9 you called?

10 HENRY: Sure, and that was about 6 o'clock.

11 UNIDENTIFIED MALE SPEAKER #1: Two hours.

12 RACHEL: Well, what can I say.

13 HENRY: At least two hours ago.

14 RACHEL: Huh?

15 HENRY: That was about two hours ago.

16 RACHEL: Well --

17 HENRY: Is he okay?

18 RACHEL: Yeah. He -- his health seems to be  
19 doing fine.

20 HENRY: Okay. I'd like to talk to him if I,  
21 if I could.

22 RACHEL: Just a minute.

23 HENRY: Thank you.

24 (Pause)

25 MR. SCHNEIDER: Hello?

HENRY: Hello, Dave?

1 MR. SCHNEIDER: Steve.

2 HENRY: Hey, Steve, how you doing?

3 MR. SCHNEIDER: How's it going?

4 HENRY: Good, how are you?

5 MR. SCHNEIDER: All right. Is this Henry?

6 HENRY: Yes, it is.

7 MR. SCHNEIDER: Okay. Where are we at,  
8 Henry?

9 HENRY: Well, you were going to check for us  
10 to, to see who was -- which one of the kids was coming  
11 out next.

12 MR. SCHNEIDER: Yeah. I went and asked quite  
13 a number of them and they all were hesitant so I  
14 suppose if thing -- I did talk to not only the kids, I  
15 went and talked to a lot of mothers and they all  
16 implied like they wanted to wait and see what he  
17 thought and so I said all right, if you want we'll wait  
18 until he's awake then.

19 HENRY: Okay.

20 MR. SCHNEIDER: So let's see here. Okay.  
21 Yeah, I just happened to be -- I heard some crunching  
22 or something, looked out the window and I see one of  
23 your tanks ran over the guard shack. I thought, I  
24 thought that was pretty cute.

25 HENRY: What now?

MR. SCHNEIDER: You know, there's like --



1 | they -- we used -- they used to call it a guard shack  
2 | out at the front gate there. Well, a tank just ran it  
3 | over.

4 |           HENRY: When?

5 |           MR. SCHNEIDER: Right -- oh about I'd say oh,  
6 | 20 minutes ago, a half hour or something like that.

7 |           HENRY: You're kidding.

8 |           MR. SCHNEIDER: Uh-uh. First today what they  
9 | did, I think it was about oh four hours ago, they're  
10 | out in the back there and I happened to be looking out  
11 | the window and I saw another one of them, could have  
12 | been the same one, I'm not sure, but he ran over kind  
13 | of a shed out there. And then just about 20 minutes  
14 | ago he ran over what they always called the guard shack  
15 | right at the gate.

16 |           HENRY: Let me ask you this.

17 |           MR. SCHNEIDER: All right.

18 |           HENRY: Do you have the facility to call me?

19 |           MR. SCHNEIDER: I don't -- I always did have  
20 | but it's been -- I've tried it recently and a lot of  
21 | times it doesn't work. I'll get to about the --

22 |           HENRY: Do you, do you have my number?

23 |           MR. SCHNEIDER: Is it something like 799 --  
24 | let's see, what, what is it?

25 |           HENRY: 0545.

          MR. SCHNEIDER: 0545. I should write it

1 right here on the --

2 HENRY: Yes.

3 MR. SCHNEIDER: Do you have a pen right there  
4 -- put it on --

5 (Indiscernible female voice in background.)

6 MR. SCHNEIDER: Yeah, can you write it right  
7 here for me so I -- that way -- I will always see it.  
8 Okay. Yeah, in fact I was wondering well, what's,  
9 what's this all about.

10 HENRY: I don't have any idea. I, I -- you  
11 know, I --

12 MR. SCHNEIDER: Are these young kids that are  
13 in these tanks that have like a itchy finger or  
14 something?

15 HENRY: You know, I don't have any idea. I'm  
16 not, I'm not close -- I, I need to check on that and I  
17 will --

18 MR. SCHNEIDER: Okay. Is it -- okay, 799,  
19 what is it?

20 HENRY: 0545.

21 MR. SCHNEIDER: 45, okay.

22 HENRY: Um-hum.

23 MR. SCHNEIDER: 0545. Good.

24 HENRY: And if anything happens --

25 MR. SCHNEIDER: Yeah.

HENRY: -- I need you to call me. Now, don't

1 --

2 MR. SCHNEIDER: All right.

3 HENRY: -- hesitate.

4 MR. SCHNEIDER: Okay.

5 HENRY: I'll tell you what, call me right  
6 back and let's -- and, and let's make sure that, that  
7 you have that availability.

8 MR. SCHNEIDER: All right.

9 HENRY: Okay?

10 MR. SCHNEIDER: I'll call you back -- right  
11 back.

12 HENRY: Okay.

13 MR. SCHNEIDER: Okay, bye.

14 HENRY: Bye.

15 (Phones hung up)

16 HENRY: Okay. Listen, I'm -- I'll, I'll need  
17 to check on that. I don't -- I wasn't aware that  
18 anything like this was going to occur.

19 MR. SCHNEIDER: Well, I -- there's, there's  
20 been other things like that but we just thought it was  
21 part of the program --

22 HENRY: What else?

23 MR. SCHNEIDER: -- of intimidation or  
24 something like that.

25 HENRY: What else? What else?

MR. SCHNEIDER: Well, what, what else has

1 | been happening around here? I know those are the two  
2 | things I saw. I just happened to be looking --

3 |           HENRY: Okay.

4 |           MR. SCHNEIDER: -- out the window and --

5 |           HENRY: Okay.

6 |           MR. SCHNEIDER: -- the others -- pardon?

7 |           (Indiscernible male voice in background.)

8 |           MR. SCHNEIDER: I guess they're doing -- they  
9 | do a lot of maneuvers all over the place and I mean, I  
10 | -- the truth of the matter is personally I don't even  
11 | care, you know, it doesn't matter to me. If, if it's  
12 | my day to go it is, if it isn't well, whatever, you  
13 | know?

14 |           HENRY: Sure, sure.

15 |           MR. SCHNEIDER: So -- but, I mean, I was  
16 | quite surprised because I -- in talking to someone like  
17 | yourself, I can't imagine that would be something that  
18 | you would deploy or something like you'd be doing.

19 |           HENRY: It doesn't, it doesn't make any  
20 | sense, it doesn't make any sense to me.

21 |           MR. SCHNEIDER: Yeah, yeah, I know, and  
22 | that's true there. You know, like originally when we  
23 | started working with Jim he -- like you were talking  
24 | about promises and word and all that.

25 |           HENRY: Um-hum.

          MR. SCHNEIDER: And Jim did give us his word

1 | that -- one of the first agreements that was made  
2 | between David and Jim was that all the vehicles would  
3 | be retracted to the -- off the property. We, we agreed  
4 | that they could be on the edge of the property,  
5 | whatever, but off the property.

6 |           HENRY: Uh-huh.

7 |           MR. SCHNEIDER: That has never been kept  
8 | because they're always -- especially right where the,  
9 | the white barn building, the block -- the cement-block  
10 | building is today they were being watched as they  
11 | rolled over the little shed beside it, they put up a  
12 | white plastic piece in front of it, then they --  
13 | always, you know, doing things like that. They're  
14 | always in it though --

15 |           HENRY: Um-hum.

16 |           MR. SCHNEIDER: -- watching us watch them and  
17 | so forth. Once in a while something -- this is what I  
18 | was told anyway.

19 |           HENRY: Um-hum.

20 |           MR. SCHNEIDER: And I happened to look out  
21 | there and sure enough I, I could see them myself.

22 |           HENRY: I see. Okay.

23 |           MR. SCHNEIDER: So --

24 |           HENRY: Let me look into this.

25 |           MR. SCHNEIDER: Okay. Yeah, because, you  
   | know, the --

1 HENRY: Yeah, because. --

2 MR. SCHNEIDER: -- truth is, they've never --  
3 you know, that, that -- even though we came with -- I  
4 mentioned it to Jim a couple of times even after that  
5 and he said he'd take care of it.

6 HENRY: Okay.

7 MR. SCHNEIDER: But I just left it go. I  
8 thought, well, okay, if that's the way it is, well, you  
9 know.

10 HENRY: Okay. Well, one of the -- of course,  
11 one of the problems that, that we've had and I'm not --  
12 this is in no way, you know, trying to justify anything  
13 because, you know, if, if Jim said that -- you know,  
14 whatever he said or whatever I say, once we say that  
15 then that's the way it has to be.

16 MR. SCHNEIDER: Right.

17 HENRY: But one of the problems of course  
18 that we've had is, you know, and this is not -- this is  
19 -- this has not been an ongoing situation it's just  
20 that we've been in a position where in going to our  
21 bosses we've been saying look, everything that David  
22 has said up until yesterday we were able to say  
23 everything that he said he was going to do he's done.  
24 He's kept his word. He said he was going to send two  
25 children out at a time and, and that's exactly what he  
did. And he asked about this and he asked about that

1 | and, and whatever -- either whatever he said or  
2 | inquired about he was being truthful, he is being  
3 | honest, he is being sincere.

4 |           MR. SCHNEIDER: Um-hum.

5 |           HENRY: Since -- you know, since he didn't  
6 | come out, you know, we've, we've had a situation where  
7 | we didn't -- and when I say we, I'm talking about the  
8 | bosses. The bosses have not felt that he was -- you  
9 | know, that he didn't keep his word and we don't have  
10 | the good working relationship that we have. I want to  
11 | continue that and that's one of the reasons that I've  
12 | been pressing to get some other children out so that  
13 | the bosses here feel comfortable that we're moving in  
14 | the right direction. We want to establish some trust  
15 | and faith and confidence with one another and that's,  
16 | that's why we want to continue that.

17 |           MR. SCHNEIDER: Well, one of the biggest -- I  
18 | guess one of the biggest annoyances, like it's, it's  
19 | always -- it's like right from the beginning since  
20 | Sunday night it's been like it's held in one's face,  
21 | it's like -- you know, it, it seems like they trying to  
22 | use some kind of an intimidation factor. But the truth  
23 | of the matter is these people aren't bothered because  
24 | we -- like I said, you know, it's hard to understand  
25 | for anyone else but we believe that there is a God  
   | seated on a throne, number one. That God is a powerful

1 God.

2 HENRY: Um-hum.

3 MR. SCHNEIDER: You and I will stand before  
4 him.

5 HENRY: Sure.

6 MR. SCHNEIDER: He's, he's got some things  
7 he's going to do that's going to shake this whole world  
8 --

9 HENRY: Absolutely.

10 MR. SCHNEIDER: -- and men are going to shit  
11 in their pants --

12 HENRY: That's right.

13 MR. SCHNEIDER: -- bottom line. And that's  
14 what it says in Hebrew in the Old Testament --

15 HENRY: Um-hum.

16 MR. SCHNEIDER: -- it really says that.

17 HENRY: Um-hum.

18 MR. SCHNEIDER: So I don't want to be one of  
19 those that are on the -- and this is why it says,  
20 "Don't fear man," Christ said in Matthew 10, "Fear  
21 God."

22 HENRY: Um-hum.

23 MR. SCHNEIDER: But see, the more you read  
24 and study that book the more it becomes that way. So,  
25 when I see man-made things here, man who is nothing but  
dust, we all have to go back to the dust again.



1 HENRY: That's right.

2 MR. SCHNEIDER: So I'm in a -- we're, we're  
3 in a place here that is not pleasant, but in the  
4 process, process of, of it all I have talked to men  
5 that I hope have caught a higher vision of something  
6 better even for themselves.

7 HENRY: Um-hum.

8 MR. SCHNEIDER: And in the process of it all,  
9 I mean we, we have communicated, we've tried our best  
10 and in the, in the process of this certain things have  
11 been said that would be taken care of are done. I  
12 don't keep on bringing it up because once it's been  
13 noted and so forth -- well, you know, just like what  
14 happened yesterday like what you say and like Jim and  
15 going to the bosses and so forth. But I -- you know, I  
16 explained as clear and plain as one could as to why  
17 that is. It always comes down to fear in God and that  
18 God said to him wait and that was -- there is no other  
19 answer, there is no other reason than that.

20 HENRY: Um-hum.

21 MR. SCHNEIDER: And we -- you and I went  
22 through that back and forth and around and around a few  
23 times --

24 HENRY: Sure.

25 MR. SCHNEIDER: -- and finally came to a  
place where we, we could see -- you know, that -- I

1 | mean that's where it is for us --

2 |           HENRY: Um-hum, um-hum.

3 |           MR. SCHNEIDER: -- so, and now we're trying  
4 | to get back working something here and getting  
5 | something going again.

6 |           HENRY: Um-hum.

7 |           MR. SCHNEIDER: But while you were doing all  
8 | of this, those guys out there trying to get the  
9 | attention of the people here by doing other things  
10 | trying to put fear maybe into them, I don't know what  
11 | they're doing. But, you know, it's entertaining if  
12 | nothing else.

13 |           HENRY: Uh-huh. Well, we don't -- I, I, I  
14 | certainly don't want that to be construed as, as what  
15 | our purpose is in terms of, you know, either trying to  
16 | entertain you or, or intimidate you or, or anything  
17 | like that.

18 |           MR. SCHNEIDER: Um-hum.

19 |           HENRY: We want to try to work together and  
20 | try to work --

21 |           MR. SCHNEIDER: Well, that's what I thought.  
22 | You know, it didn't seem like it fit with your  
23 | personality and demeanor and so forth, the way you've  
24 | been talking with me, the communication process. It  
25 | seemed to be totally out of sync with, you know, the  
   | whole -- since the time I've began --

1 HENRY: Um-hum.

2 MR. SCHNEIDER: -- speaking with you.

3 HENRY: Um-hum. Let me ask you this.

4 MR. SCHNEIDER: Sure.

5 HENRY: Did you put the number in such a  
6 location so that if you or anybody else wants to call  
7 they know that -- where that number is, prominently  
8 displayed?

9 MR. SCHNEIDER: Yeah, in fact what I just did  
10 -- when I was saying well, let's write it down right  
11 here, I literally wrote it on the wall. So I, I just  
12 had one of the people come over here. They wrote it on  
13 the wall so it's right by the phone now.

14 HENRY: Yeah.

15 MR. SCHNEIDER: So if anybody wants to call  
16 that number they can. I mean, the phone is always  
17 right in a place where anybody can make calls.

18 HENRY: Um-hum.

19 MR. SCHNEIDER: If indeed people have been  
20 checking us out for like say eight months or whatever,  
21 they -- or checked our phone calls or whatever else,  
22 you'd find out that people were calling all over the  
23 world as they always do, relatives, friends, whoever  
24 else.

25 HENRY: Uh-huh, Um-hum.

MR. SCHNEIDER: And so, yeah, anybody can

1 | call anytime they want, when they want.

2 |           HENRY: Okay, good. I -- is there a chance I  
3 | can talk to David? I, I really would like to talk --

4 |           MR. SCHNEIDER: I, I could find out.

5 |           HENRY: -- to him, yes.

6 |           MR. SCHNEIDER: Okay, sure.

7 |           HENRY: There are some questions that I need  
8 | to, to ask him specifically and there are some things  
9 | that, you know, he may want to ask of me and I want to  
10 | establish a situation. I've not talked to him at all,  
11 | you know, since yesterday.

12 |           MR. SCHNEIDER: Okay.

13 |           HENRY: Thank you.

14 |           MR. SCHNEIDER: Let me find out.

15 |           (Pause)

16 |           MR. SCHNEIDER: Yeah, he's right here.

17 |           HENRY: Good.

18 |           MR. KORESH: Hey, it's my friend Henry?

19 |           HENRY: Yes, how are you my friend?

20 |           MR. KORESH: Oh, little snoozy but we're  
21 | making it. We're getting better.

22 |           HENRY: Well, I'm, I'm hearing good things.  
23 | I understand that, that you're doing better and better.

24 |           MR. KORESH: Oh, yeah. There's -- everyone's  
25 | saying it's a miracle.

          HENRY: Great. These holes are both, you

1 | know, closing up and, you know, there's no -- there's  
2 | not too much red around them and --

3 |           HENRY: No infection?

4 |           MR. KORESH: No, none at all. And my blood  
5 | pressure and heart rate is going up.

6 |           HENRY: Good.

7 |           MR. KORESH: I'm just a little tired, that's  
8 | all.

9 |           HENRY: Okay. Well, that's to be expected,  
10 | you know, but now, are you eating?

11 |           MR. KORESH: Yeah, I had a little chicken  
12 | soup and I, I sip on this orange juice. See, it's good  
13 | when your body is hurt like that not to really eat any  
14 | hard, bulky foods.

15 |           HENRY: Um-hum, so that your body can fight.

16 |           MR. KORESH: Yeah, and let it recess so where  
17 | your hydrochloric acid doesn't agitate, you know, the  
18 | inner linings of your colon and all that kind of stuff.

19 |           HENRY: Um-hum, um-hum.

20 |           MR. KORESH: Yeah, it takes a lot of blood  
21 | from your brain and stuff and your body for healing  
22 | just to digest food.

23 |           HENRY: Um-hum.

24 |           MR. KORESH: So --

25 |           HENRY: You've been, you've been urinating  
okay?

1 MR. KORESH: Oh, yeah.

2 HENRY: And have you had a bowel movement?

3 MR. KORESH: Not yet. But like I say, since,  
4 since Friday -- since Saturday I didn't eat hardly  
5 anything and Sunday I didn't eat nothing and Monday I  
6 didn't eat nothing and, and Tuesday like I said, I  
7 started doing a little soup.

8 HENRY: Okay.

9 MR. KORESH: So I really haven't put any bulk  
10 in my system so, you know --

11 HENRY: Okay.

12 MR. KORESH: -- that (indiscernible) a bowel  
13 movement there, you know, if there ain't nothing in  
14 there it can't move.

15 HENRY: Um-hum. Okay.

16 MR. KORESH: Yeah, we're really, we're really  
17 -- you know, these big boys are out here swinging all  
18 this mud. Definitely they're all inside our, our  
19 property line, that's for sure.

20 HENRY: Well --

21 MR. KORESH: I guess they, they don't  
22 understand. I mean, you can't really blame them.

23 HENRY: Well --

24 MR. KORESH: They got to crunch up property  
25 and stuff like that. They don't know, they don't know  
what they destroyed when they ran over that blue

1 building down there do they?

2 HENRY: I, I -- you know --

3 MR. KORESH: But that's all right. You know,  
4 they -- it's not up to them to worry about personal  
5 values of things, whether it belongs to us or somebody  
6 else --

7 HENRY: Um-hum.

8 MR. KORESH: -- whether it belongs to  
9 somebody on the outside or, you know.

10 HENRY: I don't know if they're trying to  
11 adjust their positions--

12 MR. KORESH: Brand new car -- oh, you mean --  
13 that was, that was the radio -- that was the TV or the  
14 journalist's car on the streets and they just ran over  
15 two brand new ones. The government's got a lot of  
16 money anyway.

17 HENRY: What now?

18 MR. KORESH: Oh, the -- when, when the ATF  
19 first came out here --

20 HENRY: Uh-huh.

21 MR. KORESH: -- couple of journalists were  
22 out on the road or something.

23 HENRY: Uh-huh.

24 MR. KORESH: And of course, you know, when  
25 the firing started and all that they hit the ditch. Of  
course, you know, there's no bullets in those cars or

1 | nothing, you know. And so what happens is, is that  
2 | they just sat out there, guys just left them, abandoned  
3 | them.

4 |                 HENRY: Um-hum.

5 |                 MR. KORESH: Well, then somebody came along  
6 | with a tank and just ran over them and scooted them off  
7 | to the side of the road.

8 |                 HENRY: Is that right?

9 |                 MR. KORESH: That's right.

10 |                HENRY: When was that?

11 |                MR. KORESH: That took place today, right  
12 | Steve?

13 |                MR. SCHNEIDER: Yeah (in background).

14 |                MR. KORESH: Yeah.

15 |                MR. SCHNEIDER: (Indiscernible)

16 |                MR. KORESH: I mean, it's, it's kind of --  
17 | brand new car, just kind of amazing.

18 |                HENRY: Wow, it is.

19 |                MR. KORESH: They like to --

20 |                MR. SCHNEIDER: Play around (in background).

21 |                MR. KORESH: -- play around in those little  
22 | go, go buggies.

23 |                MR. SCHNEIDER: (Indiscernible)

24 |                HENRY: Well, I'm, I'm sorry that --

25 |                MR. KORESH: They're, they're, they're -- you  
know, those are National Guard aren't there in the



1 middle of --

2 MR. SCHNEIDER: (Indiscernible)

3 MR. KORESH: What series of tank is that?

4 MR. SCHNEIDER: A Bradley M-2 or 3 I think.

5 MR. KORESH: No, it's one that's got that  
6 small millimeter gun on the front.

7 HENRY: Um-hum.

8 MR. SCHNEIDER: Right.

9 MR. KORESH: Yeah, what's, what's his name  
10 told us that, you know, they had the guns removed, you  
11 know? No, that gun, that, that thing there carries  
12 three sets of small (indiscernible) rapid-fire guns off  
13 the ports of the sides.

14 HENRY: Um-hum.

15 MR. KORESH: And it, it's, it's made with a  
16 real, real small barrel.

17 HENRY: Um-hum.

18 MR. KORESH: It's either the M-2 or M-3  
19 series.

20 HENRY: Okay.

21 MR. KORESH: And yeah, I mean it was just  
22 complete lie what they, what they said about it.

23 HENRY: Well --

24 MR. KORESH: It's, it's a maneuvering tank.  
25 It's a tank that goes out into a battle. It has the  
abilities to knock out other actual military tanks that

1 | have the big caliber rounds.

2 |           HENRY: Um-hum.

3 |           MR. KORESH: But, you know, I guess he  
4 | thought because it had such a little, tiny, tiny barrel  
5 | which is, you know, about an inch or -- it's bigger  
6 | than 50 cal --

7 |           HENRY: Um-hum.

8 |           MR. KORESH: -- that he would think that we  
9 | wouldn't had a barrel on it, but flaming torch, no  
10 | doubt about it.

11 |           HENRY: Well, I'm, I'm not really aware of  
12 | the tactical team activities and, and capabilities and  
13 | all of that. I know that they've been ordered not to  
14 | go to in there, okay?

15 |           MR. KORESH: Oh, well, they're all over. I  
16 | mean, they're right back here. They came right back by  
17 | the --

18 |           HENRY: Um-hum.

19 |           MR. KORESH: -- gymnasium. I mean, you know,  
20 | they're, they're -- yeah, I'd say it has the ability of  
21 | rapidly firing 200 rounds of 25 millimeter.

22 |           HENRY: Um-hum.

23 |           MR. KORESH: That's what that is, 25  
24 | millimeter.

25 |           HENRY: Okay.

          MR. KORESH: Real little dinky one.

1 HENRY: Well, I, I think it was a real good  
2 move on your part to send, you know, another child out,  
3 you know, I, I think --

4 MR. KORESH: Well, like, like I say --

5 HENRY: -- that establishes, you know, just  
6 a, a real good working relationship with you and that's  
7 what I want to continue with you. I think that you've  
8 been sincere and honest and --

9 MR. KORESH: The children that, that -- you  
10 know, want -- they come up to me and ask me if they can  
11 go --

12 HENRY: Um-hum.

13 MR. KORESH: -- I let them go.

14 HENRY: Okay.

15 MR. KORESH: Otherwise, I'm waiting on my  
16 God, my Father, he's calling the shots now. You know.  
17 I'm the bait, you're the fish, okay? I'm, I'm on the  
18 hook now. The hook's connected to the string and the  
19 string is connected to the rod and God's got it in his  
20 hand.

21 HENRY: Um-hum.

22 MR. KORESH: It's a deep-sea fishing  
23 procedure, okay? Now, if you all want to jump me,  
24 we'll find out whether God sits on the throne or not.  
25 That's all I can say.

HENRY: Well --

1 MR. KORESH: I mean, you know, I am not as  
2 crazy as you think I am. Now, my doctrine may be kind  
3 of strange, but Hosea says in the time when God desires  
4 to reveal the deep things of his law, it'll be  
5 accounted as a strange thing. You were there when I  
6 gave Jim some of those studies today weren't you?

7 HENRY: No, I wasn't here when, when -- well,  
8 I came in when, when you were -- late in, in the day  
9 when he was talking actually to Sita I think.

10 MR. KORESH: Oh, yeah.

11 HENRY: That's when I, that's when I came.

12 MR. KORESH: Well, and, you know, I was -- or  
13 I fell, I fell into the deepest sleep I've fallen into  
14 in a long time.

15 HENRY: Um-hum.

16 MR. KORESH: I mean, for some reason it's --  
17 just like I, I haven't had this good a rest for 10  
18 years.

19 HENRY: Well, I'm glad you did then.

20 MR. KORESH: But like I say, you know -- no,  
21 I was going to, I was going to have -- if I had -- I  
22 don't know how long I've slept, but I was -- last thing  
23 on my mind before I went to sleep was, is, you know, I  
24 was going to, you know, let Jim talk to each one of  
25 these girls.

HENRY: Um-hum.

1 MR. KORESH: You know, feel them out, you  
2 know, let them talk on their own.

3 HENRY: Um-hum.

4 MR. KORESH: You know, people keep wanting to  
5 talk to me and I've already made it very plain my  
6 position, you know. Some of the girls, you know, that  
7 have already sent their children, you know, they're,  
8 they're, they're contemplating. They have to make  
9 their decision on their own.

10 HENRY: Okay.

11 MR. KORESH: You know, their, their hearts  
12 are naturally towards their children.

13 HENRY: Um-hum.

14 MR. KORESH: And, you know, that's what I was  
15 going to let Jim do, I was going to let him talk to  
16 them and, you know, like he talked to Sita.

17 HENRY: Uh-huh.

18 MR. KORESH: And, you know, when I sent Sita,  
19 Sita could -- anytime she wanted, she could just get in  
20 the van and go with them.

21 HENRY: Well, I think it's a real good  
22 position for you to take and, you know, when, when we  
23 were talking to Mark, Mark said that, you know, the  
24 children wanted to come out and that's why, you know, I  
25 thought that, that you were doing this, to ensure that,  
that the children do feel good and safe --

1 MR. KORESH: Right.

2 HENRY: -- and can get away from a position  
3 where they might feel intimidated being in a, in a  
4 situation where all of this activity is taking place.  
5 And that's why I thought --

6 MR. KORESH: Well, you know, we've been,  
7 we've been allowing the children to talk to Jim and  
8 stuff and we're telling them that he's a nice guy and  
9 stuff, you know?

10 HENRY: Um-hum.

11 MR. KORESH: And, and we're, we're not, we're  
12 not painting a very bad picture at all for them.

13 HENRY: I -- you know, I realize that and  
14 that's the impression that we have from talking to the  
15 kids.

16 MR. KORESH: And hopefully they're being,  
17 they're being very, they're being very cooperative with  
18 you. And, you know --

19 HENRY: And we're taking good care of them  
20 and we want to continue that, and, and we want to  
21 continue this spirit of cooperation that, you know,  
22 that we've reestablished with you. We know that, that  
23 you have to follow what, what, you know, what you feel  
24 in your heart that you have to do in terms of waiting  
25 for the right time, you know; the time however may be  
right for them to -- for the kids to come out now and,

1 and if, if that's the case, then we would like to  
2 continue working with you in that spirit of  
3 cooperation.

4 MR. KORESH: I have no problem with that.

5 HENRY: Okay. Okay. Would you like to send  
6 us a couple kids now?

7 MR. KORESH: Well, let's, let's just wait a  
8 minute.

9 HENRY: Okay.

10 MR. KORESH: And, you know, I like you,  
11 Henry. Let me get a little drink here. My mouth gets  
12 real dried out real quick.

13 HENRY: Okay.

14 (Pause)

15 MR. KORESH: Boy, we're lucky we got this  
16 orange juice.

17 HENRY: Yes.

18 MR. KORESH: We only got about what, 200, 200  
19 pints of it -- quarts, half-gallons of it.

20 HENRY: Good.

21 MR. KORESH: All right. Oh, are you tending  
22 to that? How does it look? Oh, it's beautiful. Boy,  
23 that was -- yeah, there was one girl here that -- she  
24 was breast-feeding her baby and --

25 HENRY: Um-hum.

MR. KORESH: -- and she didn't know what was

1 going on and the -- and the rounds started going off,  
2 came right through the wall --

3 HENRY: Geez.

4 MR. KORESH: -- hit her, hit her in the, in  
5 the -- in, in the finger right at the top of the bend  
6 of the middle joint, rode up the knuckle, went, went  
7 right into her very tip of her shoulder up here --

8 HENRY: Um-hum.

9 MR. KORESH: -- you know, made a little  
10 -- one, two, three little gouges, you know?

11 HENRY: Oh, my God.

12 MR. KORESH: Just --

13 HENRY: Is she okay?

14 MR. KORESH: Oh, yeah, she's, she's okay.  
15 Just kind of --

16 HENRY: Does, does she need attention?

21 |           MR. KORESH: How many times? They're doing  
22 | it. They're not listening to you.

23 |           HENRY: See, I'm not one of the bosses, you  
24 | know?

25 |           MR. KORESH: I know.

          HENRY: I, I, I, I -- you know --

18           DAVID: And how many times have all these  
19 churches been honking their heads saying that the end  
20 could come any day. You know, the longer, longer time  
21 takes, the less sin seems to be sinful. You know,  
22 today we have all these people doing all these terrible  
23 things in the name of theirselves, you know?

24           HENRY: Uh-huh.

25           DAVID: And it just seems to be normal  
routine life. I mean half the story is not even told.

1 HENRY: Well I think this whole incident is  
2 very unfortunate and, I, you know, I sincerely wish  
3 that it had never happened.

4 DAVID: Well, I wish Robert would have called  
5 me because, you know, I think, I think, what would have  
6 been better, now this is hypothetical--

7 HENRY: Uh-huh.

8 DAVID: --Just to make a point, maybe we  
9 should have taken Robert as a hostage, huh? We could  
10 have avoided a lot of bloodshed, couldn't we?

11 HENRY: Well, you know--

12 DAVID: Don't you think?

9 |                 DAVID: --to watch your maneuvers, look at  
10 | all your show of might--

11 |                 HENRY: Well--

12 |                 DAVID: No, listen, let me, let me, let me--

13 |                 HENRY: Sure.

14 |                 DAVID: --paint the picture, so we can watch  
15 | this exactly how this government and this world really  
16 | works. You know how this peaceful lamb-like beast  
17 | really under its breast, speaks as a dragon, you know.

18 |                 HENRY: Uh huh.

19 |                 DAVID: This is one of the greatest soci--  
20 | psychological formulas of man's division. I mean, it's  
21 | just like, you know, I realize, you know, the three,  
22 | the three men have talked with us thus far, are very  
23 | smooth, very calm, very understanding. But, what  
24 | really amazes me is how like with Jim, when I read to  
25 | him plainly from the Prophecies about an event, a  
   | Messiah, dealing in a situation with chariots that ran

1 | like lightnings, that made thunders, that had flaming  
2 | torches--

3 |                 HENRY: Uh-huh.

4 |                 DAVID: --that jostled in the streets, that  
5 | made the fir trees shake, I asked him, I said where in  
6 | the New Testament did you hear anything about Messiah  
7 | being involved with tank, with chariots with flaming  
8 | torches.

9 |                 Now mindful of the fact, we know that the Prophets  
10 | in their day could only understand the things of their  
11 | world.

12 |                 HENRY: Right.

13 |                 DAVID: I mean, you know, when it talks about  
14 | th--and their horses shall be as, you know, like the  
15 | evening wolves that are more terrible than the  
16 | leopards, and faster than leopards, you know, is the  
17 | Prophet really talking about real horses or is he only  
18 | trying to point out that he sees men which he can  
19 | identify men--

20 |                 HENRY: Uh-huh.

21 |                 DAVID: --and he sees vehicular transport  
22 | that's way beyond his comprehension and he's trying to  
23 | explain it with the things of his natural world.

24 |                 HENRY: Which he can understand.

25 |                 DAVID: Which are the things that he's trying  
to relate.

1 HENRY: Uh-huh.

2 DAVID: You know, and if they roar like a  
3 lion, does that mean that they're a lion or is a lion  
4 just the only reality that he knows in his life that is  
5 fearful.

6 HENRY: Uh-huh, right.

7 DAVID: And so, you know, it's just like,  
8 when Ezekiel says that God travels on this chariot, and  
9 that there's these flames, and there's these torches,  
10 and it sounds like the thunders of the Heaven. You  
11 see, is he really talking about a cloud or is he  
12 talking about some kind of vehicle with lights, and  
13 some kind of vehicle with, you know, makes a noise of  
14 thunder, because it's really a highly sophisticated,  
15 you know, implement of the higher universes.

16 HENRY: Uh-huh.

17 DAVID: You've seen the documentary, Chariots  
18 of the Gods?

19 HENRY: Uh-huh.

20 DAVID: It kind of develops a good scientific  
21 question, doesn't it?

22 HENRY: It sure does.

23 DAVID: Right. Well, do you actually think  
24 that man, mankind, as you know mankind, could have been  
25 realistically a part of a universal society? Remember,  
our ancient fathers have given us record--

1 HENRY: Uh-huh.

2 DAVID: --that men from other worlds have  
3 visited our world.

4 HENRY: Right.

5 DAVID: Now this is not biblical. It's more  
6 scientific.

7 HENRY: Uh-huh.

8 DAVID: You know, so all the, all nations,  
9 the hieroglyphics, the technologies of the past  
10 ancients, well, I wonder, I wonder why that the concept  
11 of good and evil is such an important part of every  
12 social direction of man. Everyone has the question of  
13 the right and wrong way of doing things.

14 HENRY: Uh-huh.

15 DAVID: But, you know, isn't it strange how  
16 that God would wait to the latter days before he passes  
17 judgement on the world? Because a lot of the  
18 prophecies of the bible cannot really be understood--

19 HENRY: Right.

20 DAVID: --until man's technology so advances  
21 to a degree that he can understand the real meanings of  
22 the prophecies.

23 HENRY: Uh-huh.

24 DAVID: Now we know the flaming, the chariots  
25 with flaming torches that make noise like thunder, you  
know, we know what that really is, don't we?

1 HENRY: Sure.

2 DAVID: What is it?

3 HENRY: Well, the same thing that you're  
4 talking about.

5 DAVID: Tanks.

6 HENRY: Right.

7 DAVID: Okay. Now, how would the Prophet be  
8 justified of such an event saying that Messiah is being  
9 confronted with a situation and yet we know clearly  
10 from Matthew, Mark, Luke and John, no such thing  
11 happened.

12 HENRY: What do you think?

13 DAVID: Well, it would make the Prophet  
14 false, wouldn't it?

15 HENRY: Sure.

16 DAVID: But of course Christ says "think not  
17 that I've come to destroy the law of the Prophets,"  
18 that's what he told his disciples.

19 HENRY: Uh-huh.

20 DAVID: Some come not to destroy, but to  
21 fulfill.

22 HENRY: Right.

23 DAVID: And, until Heaven and Earth pass, not  
24 one jot or tittle shall pass from the law or the  
25 prophets until all be fulfilled. Heaven and Earth  
shall pass away, but my words shall not pass away.

1 Now what are the words of Christ? Well, John, he  
2 always keeps telling the Jews that this doctrine is not  
3 his own, but the doctrine that he received from his  
4 father.

5 HENRY: Uh-huh.

6 DAVID: Revelation, what are those seven  
7 seals, I wonder. It's probably a situation that when  
8 Christ does come, he's going to get into a situation,  
9 'cause remember he is a political leader, isn't he?

10 HENRY: Uh-huh.

11 DAVID: Would you consider Christ a political  
12 leader?

13 HENRY: Leader of all, you know, political --

14 DAVID: Well, I mean, I'm sure that if he was  
15 to come today in the clouds of glory, I'm sure that  
16 your, your national leaders and all of your great  
17 empire directors and all that would no doubt have a  
18 united, United Council, the Pontiff and all the leaders  
19 of all churches and of all governments would come  
20 together and sit down and talk about some things cause  
21 naturally his armies of the universe is far greater  
22 than the armies of this world.

23 HENRY: Uh-huh.

24 DAVID: Okay. Well that's going to happen.

25 HENRY: Sure.

DAVID: But the thing of it is, it happens

1 after a catastrophe. Because, you know, I bet that the  
2 gentiles of today are really no better than the Jews of  
3 yesterday. What would you want to bet?

4 HENRY: I'm sure that that makes a lot of  
5 sense.

6 DAVID: You know, Isaiah said that Israel  
7 didn't believe the prophets, that's what he tells us in  
8 Chapter 1 and that God's going to forsake his people  
9 because they're like the Philistines. They're  
10 soothsayers and they have their own imaginations, but  
11 they don't walk in God's word.

12 HENRY: Uh-huh.

13 DAVID: What Isaiah says in Chapter Two,  
14 verse One, he says, "but in the last days, it shall  
15 come to pass, but the mountain of the Lord's house,"  
16 that was Mt. Zion, Mt. Zion,--

17 HENRY: Uh-huh.

18 DAVID: That's where the ancient throne of  
19 David once sat, "shall be established in the top of all  
20 mountains and shall be exalted of above all hills, and  
21 all nations shall flow in to it." Excuse me here.

22 HENRY: Okay.

23 DAVID: Now, if that's the case, then on the  
24 last days we should be waiting for that to happen. Is  
25 it spiritual, is it literal, well it says that he shall  
sit upon the throne and rebute many nations of far off

1 and they shall beat their swords and their plowshares,  
2 and their spears into pruning hooks. Nation will not  
3 lift up sword against nation. Neither will they learn  
4 more anymore. That sounds good, don't it?

5 HENRY: Well, I don't know, you know, if it's  
6 going to be good.

7 DAVID: Well, I mean if someone big enough,  
8 bigger than the world intervened and told all these  
9 brothers and sisters of this old world to put their  
10 weapons down, it's kind of like -- have you ever had a  
11 brother before?

12 HENRY: Sure.

13 DAVID: Did you ever like get into a fist  
14 fight with your brother?

15 HENRY: Well, not since I was a kid.

16 DAVID: Okay, that's what I'm talking about.  
17 But then dad kind of stepped around the corner of the  
18 hallway?

19 HENRY: Uh-huh.

20 DAVID: Kind of brought peace, didn't it?

21 HENRY: Sure did.

22 DAVID: Okay. Well, that's kind of like what  
23 has to happen because, the world, even though men may  
24 grow to maturity, they're still really in a large way,  
25 children.

HENRY: I think you're right.



1                   DAVID: And, just a lot of these children  
2 have this cover called refinement, eloquency, you know,  
3 they're good orators. It makes man seem a little more  
4 on the outside than what really man is on the inside.  
5 Now I'm sure even Pope John Paul likes to every once in  
6 awhile, I don't know, he might like to fly model  
7 airplanes or something.

8                   HENRY: Laughter.

9                   DAVID: He might like to -- he might have a  
10 choo choo train, now come on, you see what I'm saying?

11                  HENRY: Yeah.

12                  DAVID: I'm sure he might have his favorite  
13 fishing pole.

14                  HENRY: Uh-huh.

15                  DAVID: Because nobody likes to just sit all  
16 day long and read out of the Bible or read out of  
17 catechism.

18                  HENRY: That's true.

19                  DAVID: And even Solomon, that Solomon says  
20 much studiness, much study is a weariness to the mind.

21                  HENRY: Uh-huh.

22                  DAVID: Okay, so Solomon did say though, that  
23 in all of his wisdom as a great king, and you know,  
24 some of the greatest wisdom in all of the world  
25 literature wise, comes from the Bible, wouldn't you  
think?

1 HENRY: Absolutely.

2 DAVID: A lot of it's so deep a lot of people  
3 don't know the meanings of it but definitely it's an  
4 inspired book even if it's just poetic. You know, in  
5 high school you can learn bible as lit which is not a  
6 doctrinal thing, but just it kind of looks at the  
7 poetry and the connection of language, the flow of  
8 thought that the ancient writers had.

9 HENRY: Uh-huh.

10 DAVID: Anyway, Solomon, he makes a lot of  
11 comments in Ecclesiastes about life and death, love,  
12 hatred, the meanings of man, oppression and power and  
13 weakness, and he finally says in the conclusion  
14 beginning in chapters 11 and 12 of Ecclesiastes, he  
15 says, "now young man," he says "go ahead and go in the  
16 way of your heart, do what is right in your own eyes."

17 He says, "but no, that for these things, God will  
18 bring you into the judgement." He said "now remove  
19 sorrow from your heart and tears from your eyes," he  
20 says "fear God now in the days of your youth before the  
21 evil days come when you will have no pleasure in them.  
22 Before the time when the time will come when the sun,  
23 moon and stars will be darkened."

24 Now, soon the stars will be darkened. Do you know  
25 of any event in the Book of Revelation about the sun,  
moon and stars being darkened? Do you remember that

1 | last night?

2 |           HENRY: Uh-huh.

3 |           DAVID: The sixth seal?

4 |           HENRY: Right.

5 |           DAVID: Some of the stars were dark and the  
6 | stars fell due to the fig tree shaking?

7 |           HENRY: Uh-huh.

8 |           DAVID: It says at the time when the clouds  
9 | will return after the rain, of course there's supposed  
10 | to be a rain, the prophecies teach that there will be a  
11 | rain according to the time when Messiah is trying to  
12 | warn the world. (indiscernible) Nahum and it says that  
13 | the clouds will come, it will have a short rain, and  
14 | all of a sudden it will stop.

15 |           HENRY: Okay.

16 |           DAVID: And clear up. But it talks about  
17 | this belligerent power that, you know, flaunts its  
18 | might, magnifies itself against the truth, the Lord, of  
19 | course it says in the Habakkuk, it says regard ye  
20 | amongst the heathen and wonder marvously. For I will  
21 | work will work in your day that you will not believe  
22 | what we told you. Of course that's just the way  
23 | heathens are. You know, they don't take any real  
24 | warnings from God. They don't fear God.

25 |           HENRY: Uh-huh.

          DAVID: But anyway it says in Ecclesiastes

1 that you know, fear God before the sun, moon and stars  
2 are darkened, before the clouds return after the rain.  
3 Because the next time the clouds return, oh boy. The  
4 prophets teach something about these latter clouds.  
5 The gathering of these clouds in thick darkness. Just  
6 like it was two thousand years ago when Messiah was  
7 being killed--

8 HENRY: Uh-huh.

9 DAVID: --the clouds came, the thunder in the  
10 heavens--

11 HENRY: Uh-huh.

12 DAVID: --and darkness was over the earth--

13 HENRY: Uh-huh.

14 DAVID: Yeah, well, that's going to be  
15 repeated. But it says when He, God, shall rise up at  
16 the voice of the bird. Now at the voice of the bird,  
17 what bird? You know, Isaiah talks about Messiah and  
18 Isaiah calls him a ravenous bird from the east. Of  
19 course we know in Revelation, the one who seals the one  
20 hundred and forty four thousand are sins from the east.  
21 Now, this is a very clear light. As lightning  
22 (indiscernible) from the west. You know, when  
23 lightning flashes, everybody sees it don't they.

24 HENRY: Uh-huh.

25 DAVID: In Heaven there's lightnings,  
thunders, and voices isn't there?

1 HENRY: Uh-huh.

2 DAVID: God likes a lot of rain showeres,  
3 doesn't he?

4 HENRY: Sure does.

5 DAVID: Okay, so you know, these seven  
6 thunders no doubt emphasize a fact that God wants men  
7 to hear his word in thunder tones. Like in the Book of  
8 Job, God is talking to Job and God says that wisdom  
9 will be found at the end of the world in the secret  
10 places of thunder. Have you ever heard of the seven  
11 thunders yet, Henry?

12 HENRY: Seven?

13 DAVID: Seven thunders. Revelation 10, verse  
14 7.

15 HENRY: Okay.

16 DAVID: (indiscernible) mystery of God the  
17 seven thunders will be finished.

18 HENRY: Okay.

19 DAVID: The seven seals.

20 HENRY: Okay. That's what we talked about,  
21 yes, okay.

22 DAVID: Right. Now you know, a lot of people  
23 are saying that I jump all over the Bible. The reason  
24 why I do that is because all the prophets have talked  
25 about this event.

HENRY: Uh-huh.

1                   DAVID: And Isaiah talks about,  
2 (indiscernible) says, he says, "send ye the lamb."  
3 Now we know who the lamb is, don't we?

4                   HENRY: Right.

5                   DAVID: Send ye, now this is Isaiah 16, "send  
6 ye the lamb to the rulers of the land from Sela for it  
7 shall be in the wandering bird cast out of his nest.  
8 Now who's a wandering bird? The lamb's a wandering  
9 bird.

10                  HENRY: Uh-huh.

11                  DAVID: Cast out of his nest. And it goes on  
12 and talks about this bird being amongst the heathen and  
13 it says about the heathen, it says, "take counsel,"  
14 which is what we're doing now we're taking counsel. It  
15 says "execute judgement" We got to, we got to do some  
16 judging now here. It says "bewray not him that  
17 wander." You know what bewray means, don't you? When  
18 you bewray someone?

19                  HENRY: Yeah.

20                  DAVID: It means you scare them, right?

21                  HENRY: Right.

22                  DAVID: It says "scare not him that  
23 wandereth," okay?

24                  HENRY: Uh-huh.

25                  DAVID: It says, "let my outcast dwell with  
thee." Okay? Now, who is this wandering bird cast out

1 of its nest? Well, you know, right before the armies  
2 of Israel were to destroy Jericho, God placed in  
3 Jericho some spies, and these men were spies that were  
4 sent from Israel to get inside the city and to watch  
5 and to see the activities of the city.

6 HENRY: Uh-huh.

7 DAVID: Well, the leaders there discovered  
8 this and they started searching for them. And these  
9 men made their way and finally came to a harlot's house  
10 and we know harlots don't have a good reputation in  
11 sociality, do they?

12 HENRY: Uh-huh.

13 DAVID: And her name was Rayhab. Now these  
14 spies asked of Rayhab a very unique favor. They asked  
15 Rayhab to hide them. Now Rayhab had been raised with  
16 the Gods of the, you know, Philistines, the Gods of  
17 that time, Miradoc (phonetic), you know Bale  
18 (phonetic), different Gods, Ishtar and everything, and  
19 she pretty much concluded in her days of her youth that  
20 this all baloney.

21 HENRY: Uh-huh.

22 DAVID: And she entered into a profession  
23 that she knew what religion was. She knew that men  
24 didn't love her. Men loved it. So she wasn't going to  
25 be deceived by all this so called forms and regulations  
of worship. She was going to do what was natural and

1 | what was carnal. But when she saw the power of the God  
2 | of Israel in dealing with the Gods of Egypt, --now  
3 | remember in the days of Egypt they had long forgotten  
4 | the miracles done in the days of Joseph.

5 |           HENRY: Uh-huh.

6 |           DAVID: For the Pharaoh rose up and knew not  
7 | Joseph, so Israel, Egypt was once blessed, just like  
8 | America is. But they moved far beyond the beginning  
9 | point of where those blessings came from, so they came  
10 | up to the point where they had to be judged and so God  
11 | was going to use Egypt as an example to all other  
12 | nations.

13 |           HENRY: Uh-huh.

14 |           DAVID: Okay. so now here, Rayhab, the harlot  
15 | witnesses this. Now she knows there's a living God in  
16 | Egypt. Well she says to these spies, you know, why  
17 | should I hide you? Your God is a true God.  
18 | You know, but she did, but she asked, she says, look,  
19 | if I show you this mercy, will you not have mercy upon  
20 | me and my house?

21 |           And so what happened was, is that they promised  
22 | her that not just her, but all the people of Jericho,  
23 | if they would come into her house, you know, that they  
24 | would be spared.

25 |           HENRY: Uh-huh.

          DAVID: So this is the way Christ still shows



1 | mercy in the face of a pending judgement. In the face  
2 | of a catastrophe, that God's going to execute judgement  
3 | upon the cities and the nations of men who know him  
4 | not.

5 |           HENRY: Right.

6 |           DAVID: Okay, now so the only ordained  
7 | minister in all of Jericho, was a prostitute, and that  
8 | just kind of goes to show you, you can't judge people  
9 | because to whom mercy comes, the conversion comes.

10 |           HENRY: Uh-huh.

11 |           DAVID: And these are usually more zealous is  
12 | getting the free gift than others who don't need as  
13 | much mercy. Christ emphasizes this with Mary Magdalene  
14 | to whom much is forgiven--

15 |           HENRY: Exactly.

16 |           DAVID: They love much.

17 |           HENRY: Right.

18 |           DAVID: Okay, so when we, when we look at  
19 | Nahum and we say to ourselves, now, this is kind of a  
20 | complicated book and that's why a lot of people call  
21 | Isaiah, (gap) hello?

22 |           HENRY: Yeah.

23 |           DAVID: Well, you know, they call Isaiah,  
24 | (gap) hello?

25 |           HENRY: Hello, what is happening?

          DAVID: Someone stepping on the line. We got

1 | it fixed.

2 |           HENRY: Okay.

3 |           DAVID: When they read through the  
4 | prophecies, there's so much there they don't  
5 | understand, they can't seem to put the pictures and the  
6 | statements together. There's a reason for that.  
7 | Because like I said before, we've got Matthew, Mark,  
8 | Luke and John, it seems to be quite plain about a  
9 | crucified Messiah who's non-violent. He overthrew some  
10 | tables in the synagogue a couple of times, you know.  
11 | He made a whip, you know, and kind of, you know,  
12 | whipped some people--

13 |           HENRY: Uh-huh.

14 |           DAVID: You remember that, don't you?

15 |           HENRY: Sure.

16 |           DAVID: Some people don't really realize  
17 | that, but he could raise his voice a little bit. He  
18 | called people fools. He told, he told, go tell hare  
19 | that old fox, you know.

20 |           HENRY: Uh-huh.

21 |           DAVID: But you know, on the over all, it's  
22 | true, like the lady said, when they went to Gethsemane,  
23 | Christ did tell his deciples to take two swords, didn't  
24 | he.

25 |           HENRY: Uh-huh.

          DAVID: But that's all they had. But the

1 thing of it was is that when it came right to himself,  
2 you know, Peter jumped the gun and chopped off the  
3 Centurion's ear. He was a bad shot, wasn't he. He was  
4 going for the guy's head. Well anyway, the thing of it  
5 is, is that Christ did say that he could bring several  
6 legions of angels down, right?

7 HENRY: Right.

8 DAVID: But Christ didn't want to do that,  
9 did he?

10 HENRY: No.

11 DAVID: Cause he knew his own deciples really  
12 didn't believe in him yet.

13 HENRY: Uh-huh.

14 DAVID: Now he did tell Pilot though, you'll  
15 find this in the record of John. The question was, are  
16 you a king? Now we talked about the bird, the  
17 wandering bird, the lamb.

18 HENRY: Uh-huh.

19 DAVID: And the lamb that bird that's  
20 supposed to bring about judgement and counsel, God says  
21 do not scare him. God says hide him from the face of  
22 the spoiler. Okay, now the spoiler must be someone  
23 that's going to be going against this bird. I mean God  
24 says he'll raise up a ravenous bird from the east.

25 HENRY: Uh-huh.

DAVID: Ecclesiastes says God will rise up at

1 the voice of the bird. (gap) Hello?

2 HENRY: Yes.

3 DAVID: Hello?

4 HENRY: Yes. Can you hear me?

5 DAVID: Yeah.

6 HENRY: Okay.

7 DAVID: Who's on the line now?

8 HENRY: No--

9 DAVID: --try it.

10 HENRY: Okay.

11 DAVID: So Ecclesiastes says God will rise up

12 (gap) the bird.

13 HENRY: Uh-huh.

14 DAVID: Isaiah talks about the wandering  
15 bird, the ravenous bird from the east, okay? Now what  
16 is this counsel and this judgement that we're supposed  
17 to be thinking about in regards to this bird, this  
18 lamb, this wandering bird? Why are we supposed to hide  
19 him for, from the face of the spoiler. Well, what  
20 happens is, it says in this time, from that day the  
21 kingdom shall be established in mercy.

22 HENRY: Uh-huh.

23 DAVID: And he shall set up on the kingdom in  
24 the house of David judgening (sic) and hasting judge--  
25 judgement and bringing everlasting righteousness.

HENRY: Uh-huh.

1           DAVID: Now, it's kind of like wow, we know,  
2 when does that happen? How does that happen? You  
3 know, what does it mean, God rises up at the at the  
4 voice of the bird? Well what position is God in  
5 according to Revelation, do you remember? Is he laying  
6 down? Is he standing up? Or, what's he doing?

7           HENRY: In Revelation?

8           DAVID: Yeah, what's he doing on the throne?

9           HENRY: He, he's sitting on the throne.

10          DAVID: Well, he sitting, he's in the sitting  
11 position. So that's a good observation. Because when  
12 all the prophecies talk about God arising up, that  
13 means he stands up off the throne, don't it?

14          HENRY: Right.

15          DAVID: Now when he stands up off the throne,  
16 I wonder what he's going to do. Well if he rises up  
17 (gap) hello?

18          HENRY: Hello?

19          DAVID: Steve, can you, can you fix this line  
20 right here? It's, the cat, I think the cat over there  
21 is -- just wait a little bit here. They never brought  
22 us our phone yet. (gap)

23          HENRY: What?

24          DAVID: Yeah, I guess that's better. Well,  
25 okay. We just, we had to rob a lot of phones and take  
their little cords and stick them all together, you

1 | know how flimsy those little inserts are, right?

2 |           HENRY: Uh-huh, oh, okay, I see what you're  
3 | saying.

4 |           DAVID: Cause where I fell, I haven't been  
5 | able to get up yet, and you know, we kind of have to  
6 | stretch a phone to me.

7 |           HENRY: Uh-huh.

8 |           DAVID: So anyway, as we're looking at the  
9 | picture, we know God sits on a throne, he gives the  
10 | book to the lamb. We know he's going to come. He's  
11 | going to come and his testimony is going to be the  
12 | spirit of prophecy. He's going to try to teach and  
13 | forewarn the generation of which he comes in of the  
14 | soon coming impending events of the judgement.

15 |           HENRY: Uh-huh.

16 |           DAVID: So that men might divert the  
17 | penalties for not listening to this great mercy that's  
18 | revealed in truth. The truth will set them free. It's  
19 | going to be their natural nature not to want to know  
20 | truth. Cause the carnal man doesn't believe in the  
21 | things of God. So the way that we have to really  
22 | realize there's a God, is we have to stop and ask  
23 | ourselves, now wait a minute, in the book of Nahum, are  
24 | those chariots really two wheeled carts made of wood?  
25 | Or are they really machinery that transport men that  
   | have actually flaming torches that shake the earth and

1 sound like thunder and causes the trees to shake.

2 HENRY: Uh-huh.

3 DAVID: I mean was the prophet really looking  
4 at a tank?

5 HENRY: He was looking with the experience  
6 that he had at the time.

7 DAVID: And he was trying to describe what he  
8 was seeing.

9 HENRY: Exactly.

10 DAVID: Do you know what, do you know what  
11 they could have done in those days if they had a tank?

12 HENRY: (slight laughter)

13 DAVID: Do you know if we had a take in the  
14 days in two hundred years ago, we had one of these  
15 Brads what we could've done? There wouldn't have been  
16 no Indian problem, would there? But I tell you what,  
17 these things are all a part of the gifts of creation.

18 HENRY: Uh-huh.

19 DAVID: When God said in the Book of Daniel  
20 that in the last days much knowledge should be  
21 increased, he means it. And the reason being is, is  
22 that because of a lot of minds of men, in their own  
23 reasoning, they, they create within themselves oh, an  
24 infidel type spirit. Like people will say you know, oh  
25 how can God write all my sins in a book? You know and  
it seems like it would take a lot pages wouldn't it?

1 HENRY: Sure would.

2 DAVID: Well, you know, the God, God had to  
3 in the ancient times, he had to communicate with man  
4 according to the light that they had in the world. And  
5 the form of communication was developed through the  
6 hieroglyphics and finally became more short formed into  
7 the structure of sounds, the syllables, the oratations  
8 (sic) of communication, the meaning of signs and  
9 syllables, which became alphabets, numerologies. And,  
10 you know, man, man, like I say has been able to  
11 communicate, whereas in the days of Moses, God very  
12 clearly required that the Hebrew inform men by the  
13 structure of lettering, or reading, which Hebrew is  
14 refined hieroglyphics, you know, and God so inspired it  
15 by writing the, the dialogue, the Ten Commandments, and  
16 you know, God had chosen this means of communication  
17 for men to be able to transfer thought from one to  
18 another.

19 HENRY: Uh-huh.

20 DAVID: Although we know that this means  
21 sometimes falls short of actually, presenting the  
22 actual mind of one man to another.

23 HENRY: Uh-huh.

24 DAVID: I mean you can read some--you can  
25 read your girlfriend's letter and really don't  
understand what she said. So you'd have to ask, you'd



1 have to say, sweetheart, I got your letter, but what  
2 did you mean?

3 HENRY: Uh-huh.

4 DAVID: When you said blah, blah, blah?

5 HENRY: Right.

6 DAVID: Okay, well the same holds for any of  
7 the prophetic writings.

8 HENRY: Sure.

9 DAVID: Isaiah made a lot of statements but  
10 we might, we might read his writings, and we might say  
11 to ourselves, well, Isaiah, what did, what did you  
12 mean?

13 HENRY: Uh-huh.

14 DAVID: What did you really see? Of course,  
15 Isaiah's dead. Jeremiah's dead. Just about all of the  
16 prophet writers are dead, aren't they?

17 HENRY: Absolutely.

18 DAVID: Yeah, you see, so it's kind of like,  
19 when someone translates their writings from Hebrew or  
20 Aramaic into English, whatever, we're kind of left to  
21 the mercies of the interpreters, aren't we?

22 HENRY: We sure are.

23 DAVID: The translators and that kind of  
24 makes the Bible a little more weak, doesn't it?

25 HENRY: Well.

DAVID: Well, it does, because, like I say,

1 any fundamentalist will have a certain knowledge of  
2 scripture, but if he got into higher ranks of theology,  
3 with the gentlemen up there that earned their  
4 professors and doctor degrees and all that, right?

5 HENRY: Uh-huh.

6 DAVID: He wouldn't be able to contend would  
7 he? Because like for instance when you talk about  
8 wisdom in Proverbs 8 and 9, our person wouldn't say  
9 well wisdom in Proverbs 8 and 9 is talking about  
10 knowledge of man.

11 HENRY: Uh-huh.

12 DAVID: But of course their Rabbi would say,  
13 you know, he'd say not so, he'd say the word, hokoma  
14 (phonetic) which means wise woman, which goes back to  
15 the ancient concept of life. Whereas, you know, we  
16 procreate through a woman, made in the form and fashion  
17 of dust as we are. But our Creator brought this woman  
18 from our side which is a mystery of how God with His  
19 wisdom, the Mother of all Creation, His word, His  
20 spirit, that gives life unto man, can also be taken  
21 from man to make a compatible image for man. In other  
22 words, they twain are one, aren't they?

23 HENRY: Uh-huh.

24 DAVID: You're not complete unless you have a  
25 man and a woman.

HENRY: Right.

1                   DAVID: One is not complete without the  
2 other.

3                   HENRY: Uh-huh.

4                   DAVID: Okay, so it takes two heads to make  
5 one.

6                   HENRY: Right.

7                   DAVID: Okay, and that's fruitful then.

8                   HENRY: Uh-huh.

9                   DAVID: Communication, you got to love the  
10 person you're talking to. You got to understand the  
11 person you're talking to. You come together in this  
12 communication. And the highest communication is is  
13 that you all become two as one.

14                   HENRY: Right.

15                   DAVID: Offspring. So it bears fruit. And  
16 every good conversation should bear fruit, shouldn't  
17 it?

18                   HENRY: Sure.

19                   DAVID: Now, now Christ he doesn't, two  
20 thousand years ago, he doesn't, he doesn't take women  
21 and speak to them when and then come into their bodies,  
22 does he?

23                   HENRY: No.

24                   DAVID: Okay, so, so we know that out of  
25 Adam, came this power to communicate, to reason, to  
become one with oneself in the nature of God, and she

1 | was Eve, she was Eshia (phonetic).

2 |           HENRY: Uh-huh.

3 |           DAVID: He was Esh (phonetic) and she was  
4 | Eshia. But when they sinned, they were naked and there  
5 | was a discommunication, wasn't there?

6 |           HENRY: Uh-huh.

7 |           DAVID: Okay, but now, when Christ came, Paul  
8 | says he was the fullness of the godhead bodily. And he  
9 | never had a woman, but on the cross, when they pierced  
10 | his side, a woman didn't come out, right?

11 |           HENRY: No.

12 |           DAVID: But blood and water came out. Now  
13 | water seems to be a symbol of the spirit. The  
14 | submersion in the spirit, pure and holy water of  
15 | cleansing. You know, just as we have a dirty body, we  
16 | wash our bodies with water, we become clean.

17 |           HENRY: Uh-huh.

18 |           DAVID: Well what if you have a dirty mind?  
19 | How can we wash our minds from filth? Well, we have to  
20 | have a different kind of water, don't we?

21 |           HENRY: Uh-huh.

22 |           DAVID: Christ talks about living water. He  
23 | talks about a spiritual water. He was at a well with a  
24 | woman who was a Samaritan woman, and no Jewish man ever  
25 | went down to Samaria unless they were looking for  
   | prostitutes.

1 HENRY: Uh-huh.

2 DAVID: So Christ was in Samaria by this well  
3 and this woman in Samaria is there and she comes up and  
4 Christ says, you know, "Give me to drink, please." And  
5 she looks at him kind of like out of the corner of her  
6 eye, and she says, "Sir, how, how is that thou being a  
7 Jew asketh me a Samaritan woman," you know, "for a  
8 drink of water, for the Jews have nothing to do with  
9 Samaritans?" And of course you know, she's questioned  
10 this because that's just the way it was.

11 HENRY: Uh-huh.

12 DAVID: And the Samaritans considered, they  
13 were considered half breeds. They were considered, you  
14 know, mingled amongst the Gentiles (indiscernible)  
15 second temple time and the Jews just thought they were  
16 too pure them.

17 HENRY: Uh-huh.

18 DAVID: And Christ says, "Woman, if you knew  
19 the gift of God, and who it is that asketh of thee to  
20 give me drink, you would've asked me and I would've  
21 given you living waters." Now the woman looks at him  
22 kind of funny because what that means to her is that  
23 he's making a pass at her.

24 HENRY: Uh-huh.

25 DAVID: She says, "Sir, how giveth me those  
living waters seeing that the well is deep and thou has

1 nothing to draw with?" Now what happens is, Christ  
2 tells her to go call her husband. Go call thy husband.  
3 So that startles her. That shocks her. She says, I  
4 have no husband. And he says, well you (indiscernible)  
5 said you don't have a husband, but you've had five  
6 husbands. And the man you're with now is not your  
7 husband. Yeah, you're telling the truth. Now, that  
8 floored her. Okay?

9 HENRY: Uh-huh.

10 DAVID: Now, those living waters was the  
11 spirit of prophecy. The ability to know that to deal  
12 with the very necessities and needs of a simple heart.  
13 She said "Sir, I perceive thou are a prophet." And  
14 then she went into the subject of, we know the Messiah  
15 is coming and when he cometh he will show us all  
16 things. Then Christ tells her, I've been talking with  
17 (indiscernible). Then she goes and she tries to talk  
18 about the Samaritan saying that we're supposed to  
19 worship God in the mountains of Samaria.

20 HENRY: Uh-huh.

21 DAVID: And the Jews say we're supposed God  
22 in the Temple of Jerusalem.

23 HENRY: Uh-huh.

24 DAVID: Then she says, "Wwhat do you say?"  
25 He says, "Woman, verily, verily I say unto you, the  
time is coming and even as now, when they, the true

1 worshippers of God, will neither worship God in  
2 Jerusalem now in the mountains of Samaria." Now,  
3 that's very important information. He says, "for God  
4 is a spirit, and those that worship the father, must  
5 worship him in spirit and in truth." Now, see this  
6 living water, it's a unique thing to cleanse our minds,  
7 to help our minds to know where we're coming from,  
8 where God's coming from. So in Revelations 22nd  
9 Chapter, there is a River of the Water of Life, clear  
10 as crystal. Proceeding from the throne of God and the  
11 throne of the lamb, right?

12 HENRY: Uh-huh.

13 DAVID: And what is this living water? Well  
14 John says he was in the spirit. When he literally went  
15 to heaven or whether he had a vision, makes no  
16 difference. The point is, we literally see God on the  
17 throne. Must be. If we have anything to do with this  
18 Bible, must be. New Testament, you know.

19 HENRY: Uh-huh.

20 DAVID: And he must give his book to the  
21 lamb. Must be, now that doesn't mean the lamb really  
22 is a lamb. It doesn't mean he has really seven eyes.  
23 It doesn't mean he has really seven horns. But it does  
24 mean that whatever that book contains, the lamb has  
25 authority over it, that's why the horn's a symbol of it  
isn't it?

1 HENRY: Uh-huh.

2 DAVID: And he also has perfect vision of it.  
3 He knows what's in his father's book. So that when the  
4 time comes and there's time no longer, when this  
5 mystery of God has to be finished, this subject will  
6 judge the greatest nation that's ever been, and a  
7 nation that's been more blessed than any other nation  
8 in the world.

9 HENRY: That's right.

10 DAVID: And the keynote is is that sad to  
11 say, scripture forewarns that the heathen will not  
12 understand.

13 HENRY: Uh-huh.

14 DAVID: It even goes to explain why they  
15 won't understand. You see Pharaoh believed he was God.  
16 Now most people believe that whatever they think in  
17 their mind is of God. That's what I'm being accused of  
18 right now. There saying, well, he thinks God's talking  
19 to him, so he's just putting a kink, you know, in our  
20 plan or he's scared and he's trying to buy time, or you  
21 know, this is natural for the way men think. A natural  
22 terrorist would do that. A natural, you know, person  
23 that's into apparently a lot trouble would do that.

24 HENRY: Right.

25 DAVID: But really, like I was telling Jim,  
and of the two negotiators that really have it under



1 | the belt, I have to admit that you and Jim have it  
2 | together.

3 |           HENRY: Well, thank you.

4 |           DAVID: Not all the guys there. Some of  
5 | them, some of them are kind of, you know, hey you know,  
6 | it's kind of like psychology is supposed to be really a  
7 | sympathy thing. A good psychologist does more  
8 | listening than talking.

9 |           HENRY: Uh-huh.

10 |          DAVID: Because when a person talks out their  
11 | mind, you know, they're able to reach into their, their  
12 | emotional system, the genetics, the way the mind has  
13 | been taught, the way the brain cells have encoded  
14 | knowledge and experience. And, sometimes people have  
15 | bad knowledge and bad phases of experience, that are  
16 | encoded into their mind, and their mind actually  
17 | produces a physiological affect on their nervous  
18 | system.

19 |          HENRY: Uh-huh.

20 |          DAVID: Which produces an ill effect on their  
21 | physical system.

22 |          HENRY: Right.

23 |          DAVID: And people become really torn down  
24 | physically. Mental sickness is a likewise a physical  
25 | sickness. They both go in hand in hand.

          HENRY: Uh-huh.

1                   DAVID: Okay, so, so a psychologist begins at  
2 the source of all evil, and the source of sickness by  
3 allowing the person to let the wounded heart bleed a  
4 bit.

5                   HENRY: Uh-huh.

6                   DAVID: Let the sore ooze, you know, get the  
7 poison out.

8                   HENRY: Right.

9                   DAVID: And instead of a psychologist telling  
10 a person under such drama immediately what to do, they  
11 realize that the person that's having this drama has  
12 already done a lot of things which has produced an ill  
13 effect upon his perception or his course of life.

14                  HENRY: Uh-huh.

15                  DAVID: And so the person really just needs  
16 the time to backtrack and audibly speak without  
17 restraint their views which has led them to the point  
18 of their crisis.

19                  HENRY: Exactly.

20                  DAVID: So you know, this is where you and  
21 Jim have definitely done your job well.

22                  HENRY: Well, you--

23                  DAVID: Go ahead.

24                  HENRY: Well you do your job pretty well too.  
25 And I think, you know--

                  DAVID: --not bad for a ninth grade dropout,

1 huh?

6 on up hither? Up hither is my sanctuary. My father  
7 sits here on a throne. See all these thousands times  
8 ten thousands and thousands and thousands of angels?  
9 Okay. Now, my father gave me a book and don't think

7 the God who sits on the throne.

8 HENRY: Um-hum.

9 MR. KORESH: But, "They that sanctify  
10 themselves and purify themselves in the garden behind  
11 one tree in the midst," what tree do you think they're  
12 eating of, figuratively? What's the tree that Adam and  
13 Eve wanted to eat?

14 HENRY: The tree of --

15 MR. KORESH: Knowledge of good and evil.

16 HENRY: Um-hum.

17 MR. KORESH: I guess everybody likes that  
18 tree, don't they?

19 HENRY: Um-hum.

8 HENRY: Um-hum.

1 MR. KORESH: But what happens -- we used to  
2 go down there, we used to see these, these -- some of  
3 these rats were like a foot and a half long everywhere.

4 HENRY: Um-hum.

5 MR. KORESH: And some of the grain would end  
6 up with so much rat crap in it you couldn't, you  
7 couldn't believe it.

8 HENRY: Um-hum.

9 MR. KORESH: And not all that stuff gets  
10 washed out, but it does get ground up though and it is  
11 made into flour, you know? Now, if they bleach it  
12 that's pretty good, of course, bleached flour is not

14 these cal-free, talking about eating this whole-wheat

16 HENRY: Um-hum.

20 For I know their works and their thoughts: it shall

25 HENRY: Um-hum.

MR. KORESH: From the rise of the sun to the

1 west everyone's going to know who the Messiah is  
2 because God's going to, God's going to judge the  
3 greatest nation in the world, in the latter days to show  
4 the whole world that no matter how big you get, no  
5 matter how powerful you get, no matter how intelligent  
6 you get, watch the little guy. If you don't watch out  
7 for him -- you know, Robert, you know, I was going to  
8 let him stay here with me for two weeks.

9 HENRY: Um-hum.

10 MR. KORESH: You know? He could have lived  
11 right here with me. He could have, he could have  
12 discovered everything.

13 HENRY: Uh-huh.

14 MR. KORESH: I sure wish he had waited for  
15 that because he said he was going to.

16 HENRY: Uh-huh.

17 MR. KORESH: You know, really in all honesty  
18 and in all judgment --

19 HENRY: Um-hum.

20 MR. KORESH: -- the problem did not begin  
21 with us here.

22 HENRY: Uh-huh.

23 MR. KORESH: And that's why I wanted to talk  
24 so bad to Robert, because, you know, he met some of the  
25 guys, we knew who they were when they first moved in.

HENRY: Uh-huh.

1 MR. KORESH: You know?

2 HENRY: Uh-huh.

3 MR. KORESH: And I sent some of the boys over  
4 there and I said, well, this is the way the system is  
5 working and I said, remember, that these guys don't  
6 know us, they don't know me and we're going to treat  
7 them just like we treat everybody else.

8 HENRY: Okay.

9 MR. KORESH: And we sat over there and all  
10 that, we gave them them beer, cause like I say in  
11 scripture we're supposed to thithe the weak and strong,  
12 we did not excessively drink alcohol. We had maybe one  
13 beer at a time, maybe two, within a period of like --  
14 we'd regulate -- yeah, I'm a boss, I, I regulate it,

25 guys come in, but they'd just sit outside, stand  
outside in the cold.

1 HENRY: Oh, okay.

2 MR. KORESH: You know? But the thing of it  
3 was is that, you know, Robert and all those guys over  
4 there especially the one guy that was, you know,  
5 connected with the communications system and all that?

6 HENRY: Um-hum.

7 MR. KORESH: You know, I mean it's, it's just  
8 like -- man, it's like people have to always deceive  
9 and lie and, and, you know -- so anyway, we allowed  
10 them to come over. And, and I told Robert, I -- when  
11 Robert brought his AR-15 over here, one-seven twist,  
12 you know, he had, he had that trigger job done so  
13 immaculate, you know, and he's, he's trying to act like  
14 he doesn't know nothing about it. Well, there, well,  
15 there's one thing that, that, that you can never fake.  
16 You know what that is?

17 HENRY: What's that?

18 MR. KORESH: Experience. You can never act

24 can't ride a bicycle, you'll, you'll be able to show

HENRY: Um-hum.

1 MR. KORESH: So when Robert comes over here  
2 and he brings this pistol with the pin-point scope on  
3 it and all that and everything's feathered and  
4 everything and the action and all that super set on  
5 it --

6 HENRY: Um-hum.

7 MR. KORESH: -- you know, and wants to ask me  
8 about it? You know, I told him, I says, Robert you  
9 know everything about this pistol, you know?

10 HENRY: Um-hum.

11 MR. KORESH: When he comes over and he wants  
12 to talk about, you know, can he, can he shoot his  
13 pistol and all this kind of stuff, you know, I said,  
14 fine, I says, you can come over and you can shoot at  
15 the back part of the property. I says we shoot out  
16 there sometimes.

17 HENRY: Uh-huh.

18 MR. KORESH: You know?

19 HENRY: Um-hum.

20 MR. KORESH: And, and he came over one day  
21 and I went out there with him and, and, you know, I

2 HENRY: I would like to see that happen now.

3 DAVID: Well, as soon as I get the message  
4 from the headquarters I'll be out.

5 HENRY: I hope the message of the  
6 headquarters comes --

7 DAVID: Soon.

8 HENRY: Now.

9 DAVID: Well, it's not now. Okey-doke?

10 HENRY: It could be now though, right? I  
11 mean if, if it comes now, you're not going to wait?

12 DAVID: Well, yeah, if it came now I would  
13 not wait.

14 HENRY: Okay.

15 DAVID: See, I please my Father, okay, that's

4 HENRY: Um-hum.

5 DAVID: My marriage of salvation is based  
6 upon my giving of and upholding the doctrine he has  
7 given me to give.

8 HENRY: And it's important --

9 DAVID: If I, if I step on the outsides, if I  
10 bring my humanity up to front above the divinity of  
11 God's word, then, then I'm no more different than  
12 anybody else in the world. I'm a transgressor like  
13 Adam. Just because the spirit of truth can be run  
14 within my perceptions, into my veins, does not mean  
15 that my humanity is any different than anybody else's.

16 HENRY: There you go.

17 DAVID: On the contrary, I have fear, I have  
18 hunger, I have anxiety, I have tears, I have stress, I  
19 --

20 HENRY: Do you have --

21 DAVID: -- all, all the human properties that  
22 you and anybody else has.

23 HENRY: Do you have confusion?

24 DAVID: No.

25 HENRY: No?

DAVID: No, I do not.

1 HENRY: You never have confusion?

2 DAVID: I am wondering how, sometimes men,  
3 refuse to see. That's one thing that I have. But  
4 that's not in regards to the position that I stand on.

5 HENRY: No, I'm not talking about with, with  
6 respect to that, I'm just saying, do you ever have  
7 confusion?

8 DAVID: With regards to what decision or  
9 position I make? No. Look, let me tell you what  
10 confusion is. In the days of Noah, God destroyed the  
11 whole world. Why? Because of confusion. The world  
12 had gotten to the point to where they did not  
13 acknowledge God. But there was pain, sorrow, hurt in  
14 the world. Men were taking liberties of the natural  
15 realm, above the liberties of others. Men were  
16 killing, stealing, flaunting their temporal power and  
17 their temporal possessions above others. Judging one's  
18 worth and the value of the things he possessed. The  
19 sons of God, which referred to the lineage of Seth,  
20 they were kept around the territories of Eden, had  
21 finally populated in the sons of men, which refer to  
22 the descendants of Cain, were separated for the coveted  
23 promises of God, had populated, into the course of  
24 time, sensuality and evil, arrogancy and pride, it had  
25 matured. Well, finally, it repented God that he had  
made men. In other words, God was sorry that man in



1 his decision making and his liberties of being free  
2 moral agents had so inspired man to choose the course  
3 of evil more than good. So, God, in his last stance  
4 from mercy, gave into one man, Noah, a message, and the  
5 message was, is that he was to prepare an ark for that  
6 the God of creation, the God of heaven, who had created  
7 men to be happy and wholly, to walk in a law of  
8 perception and sensibility, that he was going to  
9 destroy them unless they made a protest against sin by  
10 getting into this ark. Now, many of the people that  
11 first started building the ark, right?

12 HENRY: Um-hum.

13 DAVID: They stopped, and through the process  
14 of time they went ahead and left off the work and  
15 joined the ranks of the world. Okay, now, what  
16 happened was is that finally the days came where the  
17 only ones left remaining to finish the last portion of  
18 the ark was just Noah and his immediate family.  
19 Awesome, unbelievable, right? Well, finally the day  
20 came when spirit of inspiration brought the animals  
21 into the ark and the world was amazed at such  
22 cooperation amongst the beast, --

23 HENRY: Yes.

24 DAVID: -- and some were inspired and they  
25 had an impulse that they, too, should follow.

HENRY: Uh-huh.

1                   DAVID: But, again there was the pressure  
2 from the mother, the father, the sister, the brother,  
3 the boyfriend, the girlfriend, so as it came to pass,  
4 as in the days of Noah, finally Noah and his family  
5 went into the ark and a bright light is sent in from  
6 heaven and shut the door of that ark. I give you, the  
7 habitant's of the were world startled. But again, it  
8 was explained away by scientists, by the knowledge of  
9 the earth, by the proud, by the arrogant, and what  
10 startled them, finally what took place was, the  
11 startlement was subsided because day one passed, day  
12 two passed, day three past, day four passed, and the  
13 fears of the people went away. Just like in the days  
14 of Jericho. The Israeli army's marched seven times  
15 around Jericho, didn't they?

16                   HENRY: Um-hum.

17                   DAVID: And each day they marched, the fears  
18 of the people inside became less and less. Now, the  
19 point is this, on the seventh day the only thing that  
20 God can use to communicate with that world was that the  
21 heavens changed, the condition of the atmosphere grew  
22 and there were lightnings, thunderings and voices.

23                   HENRY: Okay.

24                   DAVID: But the only voice that the  
25 antediluvian world heard was the terror in witnessing  
waters fall from the skies, and these waters lasted in

1 continual outpour for forty days and forty nights,  
2 drenching the inhabitants of the world and they cried  
3 and they screamed and they begged and they prayed to  
4 God, but they had rejected to stand on the side of  
5 truth. So, reluctantly, God was so hurt because so  
6 many were lost in that one measure of judgement. So,  
7 when the ark finally rested on Ararat, and the waters  
8 subsided, the day came for Noah to be released from his  
9 capsule of security --

10 HENRY: Uh-huh.

11 DAVID: -- and they came forth from the ark  
12 and God commanded the family of Noah to look into the  
13 heaven's, and that although they were terrified and  
14 they, they were learning of a new God, they had never  
15 seen a God like this before.

16 HENRY: Um-hum.

17 DAVID: They had never realized that God, who  
18 was so tender and merciful in creating such a beautiful  
19 Eden and a beautiful world, could in the same hand turn  
20 and desolate all the world. But still, God placed a  
21 beautiful sign in heaven. The most beautiful rainbow  
22 and the most beautiful sky, and God made a covenant  
23 saying with Noah and his family, I will never again  
24 destroy the world with a flood. Never again, and when  
25 now you look into the heavens to see a cloud pass over  
the earth, you may look up and know my covenant and me

1 with all living creatures that I will never again bring  
2 a flood and destroy all flesh from off the earth.

3 Well, that was their -- but hey, the evidence was  
4 obvious.

5 HENRY: Um-hum.

6 DAVID: The world was desolated. It took a  
7 while for the grass to grow and the trees to re-emerge.  
8 Noah and the family had to eat carcasses, they had to  
9 eat animals, you know, they had to survive with the  
10 moss and things that was growing on the earth. But  
11 none the less, man began to multiply again and the  
12 world came back and reflourished in newness of life.  
13 The grass grew, the trees grew, the world began to look  
14 beautiful again, and, again, man began to consider and  
15 wonder, they began to see clouds, they began to wonder  
16 if God's promise was for sure.

17 So man devised a plan that just in case God was  
18 not really going to hold to his word, they would  
19 combine together, utilize all mankind, because there  
20 was power in numbers. Remember man's way of thinking?

21 HENRY: Um-hum.

22 DAVID: And they did not want to be scattered  
23 across the earth, they wanted to stay together, combine  
24 together, use their minds together, and they began to,  
25 to build a city, and in the city the most greatest  
structure that's ever been known. Now, you know the

1 | pyramids are big, --

2 |           HENRY: Yeah.

3 |           DAVID: You know that there are certain  
4 | sepulchers of ancient times that are big, but the Tower  
5 | of Babel was something that if you could have  
6 | witnessed, ah massive, and they worked in the strength  
7 | of the early fathers, and they worked in the strength  
8 | of the early designs of God and they began to build  
9 | this tower and it was taller than any skyscraper you  
10 | have today.

11 |           HENRY: Uh-huh.

12 |           DAVID: Based upon totally different  
13 | principles of structural value that you even know of  
14 | today. But none the less, but God is heaven and that  
15 | sun, and that one that's brought that sun forth, passed  
16 | over the face of the earth and said behold, see what  
17 | man does? Let us go down there for and confound their  
18 | languages. For, see, for we do not confound our  
19 | languages, there will be nothing, that will be  
20 | impossible for man to do because man is made of the  
21 | image of God. So, God had to put his finger forth and  
22 | God changed their languages where they couldn't  
23 | communicate --

24 |           HENRY: Exactly.

25 |           DAVID: -- and God scattered them to  
different parts of the world and named for those who

1 still chose to remain and work on the ark, God's --  
2 came up on that city and God shook the earth and  
3 divided the land masses and put them over the four  
4 corners of the earth and God shook that tower down, and  
5 if you was to go to that place right now you'd see a  
6 small, little mountainous range, and. hey,  
7 geographically, if you really searched underneath its  
8 foundation, it's not just a natural mountain range.

9 HENRY: Um-hum.

10 DAVID: You know, present archeology has  
11 uncovered this. They always wondered where this great  
12 tower was and they never realized that there was a,  
13 appeared to be a natural course of a little range there  
14 in it, it turns out to be the remnants of that tower.

15 Now, but here's the key. A God who can take the  
16 earth and break it to pieces like a puzzle, you've got  
17 a globe, right?

18 HENRY: Um-hum.

19 DAVID: You know the continents were once  
20 joined together, weren't they?

21 HENRY: Um-hum.

22 DAVID: Don't you think that same God has the  
23 power to destroy the nations today?

24 HENRY: Sure.

25 DAVID: Well no wonder in heaven God sits on  
the throne with lightings and thunderings and voices.

1 The same God who had the power to destroy in the days  
2 of Noah, was the same God of which Christ says, as it  
3 was in the days of Noah, it will be in the days of the  
4 son of man. He's referring to himself, as the son of  
5 man, right?

6 HENRY: Um-hum.

7 DAVID: They'll be eating and drinking,  
8 marrying and giving in marriage, and we'll know not  
9 until the flood comes and takes them all away.

10 Now, today, that God who sits in heaven on  
11 the sea of glass, that God that has on his throne  
12 lightnings, thunderings and voices, has above his  
13 throne a rainbow. Now, God means what he says, and  
14 those who go contrary to what God has written in his  
15 book are in deep fire. The prophets have told us there  
16 will not be a flood the next time. It'll be with  
17 chariots and it'll be with fire. But let me explain,  
18 the fire that the prophets saw, it's not like the fire  
19 you light with a match. It's not a flamethrower fire  
20 either, but this world is going to witness a celestial  
21 display of armed forces that they've never dreamed of.

22 I'm the little guy. I need so much tender care.  
23 I need so much, I mean, my poor, weak brain, I'm just a  
24 temporal cult leader out here, in the middle of  
25 nowhere, desolate Waco, Texas, I mean, you got to be  
crazy to be in Waco, Texas. What's good in Waco? But

1 | you know, I'm in big trouble with you people, and --

2 |           HENRY: Well --

3 |           DAVID: -- I know <sup>o</sup>that, but you know  
4 | something else? What really grieves me is that if this  
5 | bible is true, you are in a lot more trouble than me  
6 | and I would do anything, anything in this whole world.  
7 | I'd make any sacrifice to keep the event that you know  
8 | not about, for lack of your knowledge, to come upon you  
9 | or anybody in the world else like you.

10 |           You know, let's keep negotiating and let's keep  
11 | listening to this fool and let's keep understanding  
12 | that whereas you give us time, and I thank you so very,  
13 | very much, for my sake and for yours, that you're not  
14 | only allowing my God to judge you, because it's a very,  
15 | you know, hey, when a person loses eternal life, it's  
16 | forever.

17 |           HENRY: That's right.

18 |           DAVID: Now, think how precious that is.  
19 | Now, it's also allowing these people that have chosen  
20 | the doctrine that I have presented, they see your arms,  
21 | they see your might, they see the definite threat  
22 | against their humanity.

23 |           HENRY: Uh-huh.

24 |           DAVID: And they also realize that for their  
25 | faith, be subjected to you, they will have also  
   | forfeited their rights of their humanity.



1 HENRY: Well --

2 DAVID: But, what I am saying is, that there  
3 is necessity for time to be given for, especially these  
4 women, to stop and judge in their hearts in regards to  
5 how they perceive the giving up of their children.

6 HENRY: But, one of the things though, is, I  
7 get the impression, when I speak to some of these  
8 people, and to include Steve, that they cannot act or  
9 make any decision without your specific instructions.

10 DAVID: That is not true.

11 HENRY: I understand, I understand what  
12 you're saying, but it might --

13 DAVID: That's why I'm telling the guys  
14 around here to watch out -- that's why me and Jim have  
15 been so careful, 'cause I have to, these are human  
16 beings around here. They have their own mind and  
17 that's why I, you know, I instruct certain of these  
18 guys here not to fire on you all. You know, and I have  
19 to keep telling Jim, I say now Jim, listen, you know,  
20 these people are beings of the, of the clay, they've  
21 got nervous systems, they have a certain way of seeing,  
22 and just as you may have individuals that you train and  
23 teach, right?

24 HENRY: Um-hum.

25 DAVID: They may still, under a real crisis,  
make a mistake, as we saw already, right?

1 HENRY: That's right, and I think a lot of  
2 mistakes were made, you know, and --

3 DAVID: And same as these individuals here.

4 HENRY: That's right, because, because you  
5 have arms too. --

6 DAVID: Exactly.

7 HENRY: -- that caused a lot of destruction,  
8 you know, on both sides. I don't think it should have  
9 happened, but it happened.

10 DAVID: Yeah, it should never have happened.

11 HENRY: Exactly, exactly, and I agree with  
12 you 100%. But I would like to see some of these people  
13 start to come out. I really, I really think it's, it's  
14 good for everybody.

15 DAVID: Well, what you think is good for you,  
16 what God thinks is good for all of us.

17 HENRY: Do you think that --

18 DAVID: Let's, let's humble ourselves just a  
19 moment and let's look up, and let's look in our  
20 scriptures and let's see who is above us all. Let's  
21 really fear God, let's really look at Psalms 45 in the  
22 light of the first seal, and let's really be honest  
23 with God now, because Psalms 45 is basically telling  
24 you what God's going to do with his king.

25 HENRY: One of the things though, that I  
think that we need to agree with, is that nobody is

1 going to use arms against each other.

2 DAVID: I'm not preparing to.

3 HENRY: Okay, well, you know, I'm glad, I'm  
4 glad of that and I'm glad also that --

5 DAVID: But I guarantee you what, if we  
6 didn't have them, you all sure would have come into  
7 here and flared your around, yours around, and busted  
8 me around and I'd never be able to say nothing. Now be  
9 honest with me.

10 HENRY: Look, I, I can tell you this. I work  
11 for the FBI, okay? I can tell you what I would do if I  
12 were there. I can't speak for anybody else except for,  
13 for Henry Garcia.

14 DAVID: Okay, so, so the, so the oppression,  
15 which always is desired to be, you know, pacified, you  
16 know, always the, the -- we always have to understand  
17 that the, the ones in charge, the ones given from the  
18 bureaucratic system, the power to exercise judgement  
19 and wisdom in discerning situations and circumstances,  
20 that if it's abused, we have to tolerate it because  
21 it's the best we have. Yes, we know you have all the  
22 media and you have all the insight to cover your butts  
23 on that. We know that. Now, a secondary --

24 HENRY: Okay, now, let me ask you this, --

25 DAVID: It may be, it may be factual also,  
that such people that commit crimes --

1 HENRY: Look, I don't, I don't have the facts  
2 because I was not there.

3 DAVID: Okay, okay.

4 HENRY: I don't have any idea. I know --

5 DAVID: But you guys were involved ahead of  
6 time. You were already informed about the situation a  
7 long time ago.

8 HENRY: I have -- I knew nothing about  
9 anything. I didn't even, you know, how would I know --

10 DAVID: Maybe not you --

11 HENRY: -- what was going on, you know -- I  
12 didn't have any idea about any of this, but, but let me  
13 say this, you -- just like you said, it shouldn't have  
14 happened, it shouldn't -- things have happened on  
15 either side, you know, I mean, things happened from  
16 either side, so, I'm not judging you, I'm not judging  
17 them --

18 DAVID: Well let me, let me take these ATF  
19 agents, and let me, let me get my jury together --

20 HENRY: I'm sure that what's going to happen  
21 --

22 DAVID: -- and, and let me, let me try them  
23 under my law.

24 HENRY: Well, you know, --

25 DAVID: Does that sound okay for you? Can,  
can the United States of America allow that?

1 HENRY: Well, God will judge them --

2 DAVID: Oh, definitely, God is judging them,  
3 no doubt about it, but --

4 HENRY: Okay, and the facts will be judged in  
5 the court of law and that's why --

6 DAVID: Now, wait a minute, whose court of  
7 law? We already know your court of law. We already  
8 know in 1988, that I sat and I was given statements  
9 from a prosecuting attorney such as this, Okay,  
10 Mr. Howe (Phonetic), the night you went out there to  
11 murder George Roden (Phonetic), did you ever stop to  
12 think that what you was doing was wrong, yes or no?  
13 Now, I do need to explain. I -- no, I just want a yes  
14 or a no. You see, that, that is a hanged statement,  
15 and that, you know, that should not even be allowed in  
16 a court of law. But it was in my case.

17 HENRY: Were you found innocent or guilty?

18 DAVID: What happened to me was, is that  
19 according to the laws and precepts of the law, when a  
20 jury is chosen, it is required that no member of that  
21 jury is to be associated with either the defense or the  
22 prosecution, right?

23 HENRY: Um-hum.

24 DAVID: They're to be strangers, aren't they?

25 HENRY: Um-hum.

DAVID: Well, then why was it allowed that

1 | one of the black individuals was a close friend of  
2 | Mr. Shabaz (Phonetic)? Why was that allowed? And why  
3 | was it that the jury could not make a decision on my  
4 | case? Well, what happened was, after the decisions  
5 | were made and the acquittal of the seven others, we  
6 | threw a little party down at our studio. We had a  
7 | little music studio down off of 17th Street, and we  
8 | invited the jury members to that party.

9 |           HENRY: Uh-huh.

10 |           DAVID: Huh?

11 |           HENRY: I'm saying uh-huh.

12 |           DAVID: Okay. Well, what happened was, some  
13 | of the -- well, the man that was in charge of it, they  
14 | began to explain, they began to say, now, look, we  
15 | don't know why, but there was an individual and another  
16 | individual that, which these people did not come to the  
17 | party, okay?

18 |           HENRY: Uh-huh.

19 |           DAVID: It was the two black members. And  
20 | that no matter what we reasoned, what we said to them,  
21 | they would not admit that you were not guilty, and we  
22 | couldn't -- we worked on it for hours, we, you know, we  
23 | talked to them, they said, but, but Mr. Howe, they  
24 | says, you know, -- So finally, what we decided to do,  
25 | is we decided to agree that we was going to, going to  
   | go ahead and acquit the other seven and they was going

1 to come back in again and vote on you, and then we was  
2 going to make you guilty. And so they agreed with  
3 that. So, we went ahead, and we gave our decisions on  
4 the seven, went back in on you and then we went ahead  
5 and it was a hung jury again.

6 HENRY: Uh-huh.

7 DAVID: But they had to do this, they had to,  
8 the people that heard the evidence on both sides, after  
9 the second they had decided what was taken place here,  
10 you know, originally, -- Well, you'd know, you should  
11 know at this time about the speculations of Vic Fazell  
12 (Phonetic) and his dealings with the, you know, you  
13 know, Waco is known for its methamphetamine, you know,  
14 that don't you?

15 HENRY: Um-hum.

16 DAVID: Okay, and it's drugs?

17 HENRY: Um-hum.

18 DAVID: I mean, you know, it's such a nice  
19 place around here and everything. Well, we came back  
20 on the property in 1988, that's what they were in the  
21 process of doing. Now, the sherriff's department knew  
22 about that. They knew completely about that.  
23 Especially with individuals such as Donny Joe Harvey,  
24 Roy Borwells (phonetic), you know, George Roden, you  
25 know. The thing of it was is that individuals who'd  
been saying that George was into the experimentation of

1 a little coke here and there, you know, all hearsay  
2 stuff, but of course, the purposes of this is that when  
3 he started digging up the cemetery, you know, the  
4 cemetery, the question was, what is this man doing?  
5 Where is he coming from? Well, what did I do? I  
6 simply went to the sherriff's department, and I  
7 explained to, you know, the sherriff, Dickerson, who's  
8 now, you know, he has Parkinson's Disease or something,  
9 off the force, I explained to him the situation and I  
10 asked that he would go out to Mt. Carmel and look into  
11 this and deal with it. It's called corpse abuse.

12 HENRY: Uh-huh.

13 DAVID: He wouldn't do nothing. Kept telling  
14 me we had to have evidence. Well everybody could see  
15 him out there anytime, digging in the cemetery with a,  
16 with a John Deere 1010 tractor.

17 HENRY: Uh-huh.

18 DAVID: Okay, well, what happened was, is it  
19 was really kind of funny. So then, I'm down in  
20 Palestine where we had to purchase a property down  
21 there because of all the people that originally were,  
22 had bequeathments and second tie rights for the  
23 property here, we had to re-locate them because George  
24 had, had ran them all off with a semi-automatic Uzi.  
25 When his mother, who was the director at that time,  
tried to talk to the people to give her time to work



1 | with them, they, in Christian faith, you know, went  
2 | ahead and didn't enact a restraining order against him,  
3 | 'cause he had a restraining order against him since  
4 | 1978, which, in allowing him to come back on the  
5 | property, that violated the rights to enforce the  
6 | restraining order.

7 |           HENRY: Um-hum.

8 |           DAVID: So he wasn't going to move. The  
9 | people couldn't move back, and the law was not going to  
10 | enforce it. Okay, so, we had, we had a waiting period  
11 | there. Then all of a sudden this George guy calls me  
12 | up and tells me that he's got this lady that was buried  
13 | twenty, some twenty years ago, back in '88, and, you  
14 | know, challenged me to a duel to resurrection. And I  
15 | told him, I says, "George, not today." You know,  
16 | George, like a lot of people, didn't understand where I  
17 | was coming from.

18 |           George became upset when I first came here in  
19 | 1981, because this little group of people were known  
20 | for many years to be people who have ever accepted  
21 | light as it unfolds. Okay, so naturally when God's  
22 | going to do work, he's going to choose people and have  
23 | ears to hear and eyes to see, right?

24 |           HENRY: Um-hum.

25 |           DAVID: So I began to come here and these  
people were considered to be one of the top bible

1 | people in the whole world. I mean, that's, that's all  
2 | they've done ever since the '30s, is they've studied  
3 | the prophecies.

4 |         Well, when I came, all of a sudden the mysteries  
5 | unfolded. Well, this outraged George. George has this  
6 | idea that he's supposed to be the heir of this property  
7 | because his mother and father was the original  
8 | originator of this association.

9 |             HENRY: Um-hum.

10 |            DAVID: Well, things didn't work out so he  
11 | took the situation by force. Dickerson told us that if  
12 | we would get pictures of the casket, then he would come  
13 | out here and deal with the situation.

14 |            HENRY: Okay.

15 |            DAVID: I hired a guy that was allowed to  
16 | come back and forth, his name was Sam Jones, you know,  
17 | who started a connection with George, and I hired him  
18 | and I gave him a little camera, a little Instamatic.  
19 | He came and he walked into the church. He took all  
20 | these pictures from all angles. So we had the pictures  
21 | developed, went back to the sherriff's department, and  
22 | did they move on it? No. You know what his reply to  
23 | me was?

24 |            HENRY: What?

25 |            DAVID: He looked through them, he looked  
kind of worried. He says, well, I don't know that

1 and I went to K-mart and I bought, you know, shot guns  
2 and stuff like that and the whole plan revolved around  
3 diversion. Diversion. We got eight guys together.  
4 Some came up by the, by the lake. The others were out  
5 by the dump ground out here, where some of your guys  
6 are at right now. You know, it's in the back here.

7 HENRY: Uh-huh.

8 DAVID: And me and Dave and a guy named Mark,  
9 -- a van drove by, it was like 2 or 3 in the morning,  
10 real slow, we hopped out, we crawled across the road  
11 and crawled all the way over to the church, which is  
12 the front and foremost building, and we, you know, we  
13 watched and everything and, and Mark went inside to  
14 take the pictures.

15 Well, what happened was is that as we was standing  
16 there, or actually staying a good odd distance. There  
17 used to be an old trailer out here between the, where  
18 church building use to be, up towards the front, and to  
19 where the old, old truck trailer is, towards the back  
20 of the property there. You'll see it there on the  
21 right if you're looking towards the front of the  
22 building, in front of the property.

23 HENRY: Um-hum.

24 DAVID: And there was a trailer, a double-  
25 wide trailer, that was where George lived. I'd say  
it's about a 150 yards away from the church.

1 HENRY: Okay.

2 DAVID: Well, so we're there and all of a  
3 sudden this dog comes walking up. He comes walking up  
4 on the road, he looks over and he sees me and he just  
5 turns around, he just walks real calmly, slowly, all  
6 the way back. When he walked back he went into the  
7 trailer kind of like, and all of a sudden there's  
8 barking everywhere. These dogs are from everywhere.  
9 So George's lights went on and, and where we're looking  
10 for him we saw him get up and look out his big window  
11 there and he was in his t-shirt and in his underwear.  
12 He grabbed this big spotlight and started shining  
13 everywhere. So, Mark came out of the church and says,  
14 you know, the casket's not there.

15 HENRY: Um-hum.

16 DAVID: The casket's been moved. So the  
17 dog's are hollering and running so, so we commenced to  
18 crawl all the all the way out to the, to the road  
19 there, Double E Ranch Road, and you'll notice where the  
20 two water towers is, between there and our entrance is  
21 that little barn down there, a little tin shed and a  
22 little -- block shed, where some of the agents right  
23 now are at.

24 HENRY: Um-hum.

25 DAVID: So we crawled on our bellies all the  
way down that ditch line, all the way over to that

1 building and ran way on out in Perry's field to circle  
2 completely around the back of the property, all the way  
3 to the back of the property. So we met with the other  
4 guys and then we went all the way back out towards the  
5 power lines and we all re-met at the power lines.  
6 Nothing happened. Okay? George wasn't shot at. George  
7 wasn't killed. Nothing happened.

8 Now we're all down there, and we're saying now,  
9 look at this. He moved the casket. What's going on?  
10 The old people are living in Palestine -- now, now  
11 listen to this.

12 HENRY: Um-hum.

13 DAVID: They were living in Palestine,  
14 ranging from ages of 40's, well actually 50's, up to 80  
15 something years old, originally they possessed the 13  
16 houses out here, but they were all moved off, and we  
17 had to build little sheds down in Palestine, 8 X 16,  
18 --

19 HENRY: Uh-huh.

20 DAVID: -- all plywood, 2 X 2 framing, just  
21 as a standard housing thing. Most of these people been  
22 in religion for years and they've outlived their kids.

23 HENRY: Um-hum.

24 DAVID: So anyway, so we're saying, we've got  
25 to find that casket, what are we going to do?

HENRY: Um-hum.

1           DAVID: Well, what took place was we came in  
2 the morning, early in the morning. We slept outside  
3 that night. Early in the morning we re-gathered up  
4 around where the dairy barn is over here, where your  
5 agents are right now. Good locations, I have to admit.

6           HENRY: Okay.

7           DAVID: And we, we came up and I said, "This  
8 is what we're going to do. We need to wait until, you  
9 know, everybody leaves, if we can make sure everybody  
10 leaves the property and look around a little bit and,  
11 you know, stay out of sight, and see if George has  
12 dumped this casket somewhere.

13          HENRY: Uh-huh.

14          DAVID: So all the house -- but the place  
15 looked like trash. The houses, they were had -- they  
16 had had no paint on them for a year and a half, and you  
17 have to paint the houses out here at least once a year  
18 'cause the way the humidity is and all that, it's just  
19 the paint cracks off. So, like I said, we were armed,  
20 that's true. But why we were armed, well, that was  
21 already, that was clearly made known, even after the  
22 so-called gun battle. The gun battle took place with  
23 lots of rounds being fired right into the ground.

24          HENRY: Okay.

25          DAVID: I mean there was no, there was no  
bullet holes in no houses, no bullet holes in no cars,

1 | no bullet holes nowhere but in one tree.

2 |           HENRY: Uh-huh.

3 |           DAVID: Now, you see, the people, the people  
4 | don't -- now there's bullet holes everywhere, it's  
5 | different now.

6 |           HENRY: Yes, absolutely.

7 |           DAVID: But here's the deal. The deal was,  
8 | is that, you know, we started up, and I went into the  
9 | first house on the far side of the property, man, it  
10 | was trashy. It had trash in there, it had goat crap in  
11 | there, it was like, you know, old beds, like, someone  
12 | had been in there doing some wrong things, you know,  
13 | you know how drug addicts do.

14 |           HENRY: Um-hum.

15 |           DAVID: And, you know, and the second house,  
16 | no one's there, and the third -- now, we waited. This  
17 | took about, about, till about eleven, or so, o'clock,  
18 | 'cause we had a, a zoom scope, and, and we was, we was  
19 | doing our little ATF work then ourselves, okay? You  
20 | understand?

21 |           HENRY: (Laughs)

22 |           DAVID: So, you know, we were being very  
23 | cautious and everything, and so, we finally came up to  
24 | some houses, and we looked in one house and, you know,  
25 | it was like, all these houses were trash and which we  
   | got all the pictures to show that. And pornography

1 | everywhere. I mean, Playboy, Penthouse, I don't know,  
2 | just, everything. Anyway, just a lot filthy stuff.

3 |           HENRY: Um-hum.

4 |           DAVID: And so we came to one house and we  
5 | looked, we looked in the door there and there was this  
6 | shotgun there, and we picked up a couple of weapons.  
7 | It was just like laying close to the doors, you know?

8 |           HENRY: Uh-huh.

9 |           DAVID: And they were confiscated along with  
10 | our weapons too, and they were saying they were ours,  
11 | but they really weren't. So what happened was, we  
12 | finally came up to this one house, we're behind this  
13 | house and like, two guys at a time, right?

14 |           HENRY: Um-hum.

15 |           DAVID: And two guys, like, move up behind  
16 | each house 'cause our, our plan is that if anything  
17 | happens, we want to divert, we want to get out of  
18 | there.

19 |           HENRY: Um-hum.

20 |           DAVID: So finally we're there and all of a  
21 | sudden, lo and behold, this girl comes out of this  
22 | house and she's, she's, you know, she's walking in  
23 | these real short shorts, I've never seen them before,  
24 | and you know --

25 |           HENRY: Wait hold it, what?

          DAVID: Short shorts.



1 HENRY: Oh, okay.

2 DAVID: Which, you know, this religion, we  
3 don't do that.

4 HENRY: Um-hum.

5 DAVID: Of course, it was not a religion when  
6 George Roden was occupying the place.

7 HENRY: Um-hum.

8 DAVID: And I need to tell you also, his  
9 mother had passed away too, while he was there.

10 HENRY: Um-hum.

11 DAVID: And so what happened was, is she had  
12 her halter top off and she came around and she walked  
13 right by two of those guys and, you know, she came by  
14 and all that and, you know, she sees us there and  
15 everything and we had bought some K-mart, you know,  
16 those deer hunting suits?

17 HENRY: Oh, yeah.

18 DAVID: So she comes around and she says,  
19 what, and I says, I says, come here. You know. She  
20 says, what are you? Are you all policemen or what?  
21 And I says, look. I says George Roden's got a casket,  
22 out here right? And she goes, yeah. You know, and I  
23 says, we're here to, to find out where this casket is.  
24 She goes, I don't know where they put it. You know?

25 HENRY: Um-hum.

DAVID: So right there we knew, okay? So

1 | then this, this other girl comes out and she's, she  
2 | sees two guys there and, you know, like, they're face  
3 | to face, and she goes, who in the hell are you?

4 |           HENRY: Um-hum.

5 |           DAVID: You know, and this guy, he goes,  
6 | we're here to, to try to find the casket that George  
7 | Roden's been digging out. And she curses him out, steps  
8 | on out the door, gets to her little car out there, you  
9 | know, and drives up to the trailer --

10 |           HENRY: Um-hum.

11 |           DAVID: -- where George is residing. We're  
12 | going, oh no, what's going on now, right?

13 |           HENRY: Um-hum.

14 |           DAVID: So this girl, you know, she's  
15 | standing there by us, and this is even her own  
16 | testimony, you know? She says, you know, I said, I  
17 | said, look, you know, you need to be going out of here,  
18 | you know, we may have some trouble, or something like  
19 | that. And she goes, no, I'll stay here. You know.  
20 | And she goes, she said something like she had worked at  
21 | the police department before or something like that.  
22 | So we're there and all of a sudden this George comes  
23 | walking down from the trailer, walking down the road,  
24 | and he's got, you know, his t-shirt, and he's got his  
25 | pants and he's got his black cowboy hat on and he's got  
this Uzi, side-strapped to his right shoulder.

1 HENRY: Uh-huh.

2 DAVID: I mean, just as strutting and as  
3 proud as can be, you know. So he stands out there at  
4 the corner and he's right there in the middle of the  
5 road, you know, right in dead sight. Now tell me how  
6 eight guys, heavily armed, is what all of the t.v.  
7 shows say, how do eight guys heavily armed, miss a fat  
8 guy standing in plain sight, ranging from the distances  
9 of, oh, 40 yards to no more than 75 yards, how do they  
10 miss him?

11 HENRY: Good question.

12 DAVID: Okay, now, here's the deal. Stan had  
13 moved over from one house and, the building that's now  
14 here wasn't here. The old building had burnt down.  
15 And he had moved over towards the structure and George  
16 came up and says, you know, state who you are, you  
17 know? Show yourself, you know?

18 HENRY: (Laughs)

19 DAVID: And what happened was is Stan, Stan  
20 had been raised with George. This is what's really  
21 irony. Stan and George had been like, you know, known  
22 each other for years. And Stan, you know, he's moved  
23 back from Massachusetts and he says, he says, George,  
24 we don't want no trouble. What did you do with the  
25 casket? Put your gun down. And all of a sudden, you  
know, George steps back and fires in the direction of

1 Stan, and the bullet hit a part of the concrete and  
2 ricocheted up and hit Stan in the leg.

3 HENRY: Um-hum.

4 DAVID: Now, when I was at K-mart and I was  
5 buying one of these suits, some of the other guys were,  
6 you know, buying some too, they had a sale on these  
7 pocket knives where it has like a spoon, and a fork, a  
8 little knife, you know, a pair of scissors in it.

9 HENRY: Uh-huh.

10 DAVID: So we had bought a bunch of those and  
11 I bought him one. I bought two or three of the guys  
12 one, and he had had that in his pocket and that's where  
13 that bullet, that bullet hit from a ricochet, it wasn't  
14 a direct hit, that bullet hit that knife and just, just  
15 dented the whole thing right up. You know, so, that's  
16 how luck ran. Okay, so at that time, the guys had been  
17 told before we was to create a diversion. We hadn't  
18 really, you know, really planned anything so all of a  
19 sudden here comes, you know, six or seven firearms,  
20 blasting away. It sounded, it sounded like Viet Nam,  
21 you know, bam, bam, bam, right? So George, his eyes  
22 get real big, you know, I mean, real big.

23 HENRY: (Laughs)

24 DAVID: And he starts back pedaling his  
25 little fat butt as fast as I've seen any, any, any  
fullbacker, you know, running back do it. I mean, this

1 | guy, this guy is beyond NFL pro.

2 |           HENRY: (Laughs)

3 |           DAVID: He is back pedaling like everything  
4 | -- he never in his life realized. But the thing of it  
5 | was is that, hey didn't drop because nobody was  
6 | shooting at him. Everybody was shooting right into the  
7 | ground. Now, you know, 223, which, you know, we bought  
8 | some of these ruggers (Phonetic). We had some shotguns  
9 | and, you know, some had some .22s. Now, you know,  
10 | those ruggers are loud. They're louder than the  
11 | shotguns were. But boy, it sounded like earth thunder.  
12 | This guy was back pedaling and, like I say , he, he,  
13 | you know, with all that firing at him, all those eight  
14 | lousy shots, you know, 'cause I, I hadn't fired yet,  
15 | I'm, like, thinking, oh, no, you know. He back pedaled  
16 | all the way from where he was standing which was closer  
17 | to the, let me see, let me give you a point of  
18 | position, okay, do you know where our sandbox is?

19 |           HENRY: No.

20 |           DAVID: In the front of the property? If you  
21 | were standing right in front of our building, the far  
22 | left of our building there is a sandbox for the kids to  
23 | play in. Okay, you know where the water tower is?

24 |           HENRY: Um-hum.

25 |           DAVID: Okay, if you were standing on the  
road facing the water tower, that's where he was

1 standing.

2 HENRY: Okay.

3 DAVID: And, like I say, I was about 45,  
4 about 45 yards from him, I guess. Okay. And Stan was  
5 about, oh, maybe, I don't know, twenty something or  
6 thirty yards away from him, from a side direction.

7 HENRY: Um-hum.

8 DAVID: And of course there was each little  
9 house had two or three guys standing behind it. So,  
10 you know, everybody's just banging, banging, banging,  
11 and this guy thinks he's dead a hundred times over, and  
12 he back pedals and he goes behind these cars and he  
13 keeps going, so I came from in the house and I told  
14 him, and I says, throw your gun down, George. You  
15 know, we don't want any trouble. Of course, you know,  
16 yeah, he thinks that, right?

17 HENRY: Um-hum.

18 DAVID: So anyway, so he runs around to the  
19 back side of the house that was where, where our bus is  
20 right now. Okay, where our bus is right now on the  
21 property, there use to be a house there.

22 HENRY: Okay.

23 DAVID: As a matter of fact, the foundation  
24 is still there. 'Cause that's where his mother use to  
25 live.

HENRY: Oh, okay.

1           DAVID: And he ran back to that area and he  
2 stood to the side of it, the far side of it, --

3           HENRY: Um-hum.

4           DAVID: And what happened was is I was  
5 running out towards the back part of the field so I  
6 could come to the back side to see where he was going.  
7 Anyway, the two oldest men, Floyd and Stan, which, like  
8 I say, both of these guys are in their 50's, yeah,  
9 yeah, they're in their 60's -- they were in their 50's  
10 then, they had, they had gotten themselves out in the  
11 open and all of a sudden George re-emerges on the back  
12 side of this far house and I'm out there in the open  
13 and all of a sudden I, I hear this zap, zap, zap, and  
14 his Uzi, if I'm not mistaken, shoots .45s, and those  
15 things whistle. When they sound like, they sound like  
16 a jet coming through the air. And that's the first  
17 time I ever had an experience with a projectile coming  
18 close to my body.

19           HENRY: Um-hum.

20           DAVID: So I'm going like, whoa, God, you  
21 know, we need some help on this one. So I quickly ran  
22 out to a farther part of the field where there was an  
23 old car, and I jumped back behind this old car. It was  
24 an old, I forgot, one of those, like a Studebaker, but  
25 it was a different kind of a Studebaker, but anyway, I  
was back behind there and next thing is I hear this

1 rap, rap, rap, and I see these two older guys. There  
2 is a foundation out of the ground, out here they pour  
3 -- they pour furrows, they pour foundations like a pair  
4 of beams?

5 HENRY: Uh-huh.

6 DAVID: And they were, they were back trying  
7 to get down and there was still, you know, ashes and  
8 soot from where the building originally stood, that was  
9 still settling into the soil, and this stuff was flying  
10 up like, big old clouds, smoke is -- George is actually  
11 aiming to hit these two guys. And that's when it got  
12 real serious. That's when everything was out of hand.  
13 But what, what should have happened though, is that  
14 these guys should have, you know, stayed back behind  
15 the houses. You know, they should have stayed back  
16 behind the houses. But, you know, that's why I  
17 understand, humans are humans.

18 HENRY: Sure.

19 DAVID: And they weren't shooting at George  
20 at all.

21 HENRY: Uh-huh.

22 DAVID: So then what happened was, where I  
23 got involved is that, you know, here he's shooting so I  
24 started shooting real, you know, real fast, so George  
25 back-tracked again and got behind this tree. The tree  
still stands over there near the, near the far right of



1 | the property where the little boat shed is.

2 |           HENRY: Okay.

3 |           DAVID: And George got behind this tree, and  
4 | so George starts shooting out behind, from behind this  
5 | tree. And Stan and Floyd were still pinned down to the  
6 | ground. All right. So I had to make decisions. I  
7 | didn't really want to shoot directly into the air  
8 | because what direction is that?

9 |           (Tape ends.)
